VANCOUVER, Dec. 16—As 1936 goes into history Canada's Pacific gateway looks hopefully into the future behind it a summer spent celebrating accomplishments of its first 50 years life as a city.

CANNES, Dec. 16—(AP)—A French taxpayer's protest brought hasty assurance from Mayor P. Perre Nouveau tonight that he didn't dig into the public coffers of Cannes to pay for Wallis Warfield Simpson's flowers.

The Mayor sent Mrs. Simpson a big bouquet yesterday after a crowd of curious persons, attracted by the spectacle of the Duke of Windsor's betrothed buying stockings had made necessary a detective escort to get the noted shopper to her automobile.

Today, while Mrs. Simpson remained at the Villa Lou Viel, an irate taxpayer informed the Mayor he wasn't going to pay any more taxes in the future if the money was to be spent that way.

Mayor Nouveau, summoning newspapermen, explained the money came from his own pocket.

Cannes' most famous hair-dresser arrived at the Villa during the day to adjust the American divorcee's much-pictured coiffure. A manicurist came along too.

Guards will be maintained at the Villa, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Herman L. Rogers, for an indefinite period, the host said.

Meanwhile, at the Cannes telephone office a special operator was employed to handle Mrs. Simpson's calls—particularly those to the Duke of Windsor at Exeter, Austria.

Mrs. Simpson ordered her entire wardrobe sent here from London today.

Canadian Bear Cubs Consigned For Belgium

MONCTON, N. B., Dec. 16—Three Canadian bear cubs from Quebec are destined to spend their Christmas far from their native haunts. The three passed through Moncton today in charge of the Canadian National Express consigned via Halifax to a zoo in Belgium where they will in future make their home. At Halifax the cubs will be loaded in the ship that will take them overseas to Belgium. When seen in Moncton the cubs did not appear to mind their parting from their native soil for they were having a rather lively time of it inside the large crate in which they were confined.

Express traffic at this season of the year is very suggestive of Christmas time what with consignments of toys, fruits, gifts, cut flowers, etc. "We handle quite a quantity of cut flowers around holiday times, particularly at Christmas," stated F. M. Smith, Canadian National Express superintendent here. "Some of these travel long distances. For instance, today we handled a consignment of cut flowers all the way from a point in Ontario for the Christmas trade in St. John's, Newfoundland. The flowers are packed in ice which preserves them during the journey. The peak of our Christmas traffic will probably be reached this weekend," said Mr. Smith.

That satisfied him and he would walk away smiling — without the painting.

CHRISTMAS SCENES

A picture like this will become a most cherished possession a few years hence. Begin your picture record now.

CHRISTMAS comes and Christmas goes, year after year, each so much like the other, as we look back on them, that, unless we are children, none seems to stand out in our memory.

We know that there was a Christmas tree and that, underneath and around it, were piled a miscellaneous lot of packages and that the children had a joyful time opening them. But any details of the scene are usually too elusive to give us any particular pleasure—that is, unless we are among those who do not let Christmases go by without taking pictures of the celebration.

Those who customarily do this possess precious reminders of scenes that are entirely different each year, chiefly because the principal actors in them, the children, grow and change. Ten years ago Baby Willie was delighted with a jack-in-the-box but now it is young Master Willie enthralled by his first electric train. The picture comparison of Willie on these two Christmas mornings is a joy to behold and, as the years go by, these pictures become more and more precious.

Now that indoor picture-taking has been so greatly simplified by the invention of photographic flash bulbs and flood light bulbs for use in the home at small cost, there seems to be no longer any excuse for camera owning families failing to make picture stories of every Christmas holiday's good times.

The tree alone can be taken with a time exposure by ordinary electric light illumination, plus the lights of the tree, but, of course, for real story-telling pictures of Christmas, you want members of the family in them, pictures that call for split second exposures. For these the flash bulb does away with any question of exposure time because the flash is always about 1/50 second of intensely brilliant light, the picture being taken with the lens open. Almost any kind of camera that can be set for "time" or "bulb" action can be used.

For taking a considerable number of pictures, however, the longer burning flood light bulbs are less expensive per picture. With an f.8 lens or faster and with two or three of these lights burning in wall sockets or floor lamps, snapshots may be taken at 1/25 second. If your camera is of the slower lens type or a box camera, the illumination must be more intense. But flood lights for such cameras are also available.

Another Christmas will soon be here. Why not take some of these pictures? The possibilities are endless. 116 JOHN VAN GUILDER.
