**Financing School Fairs**

The Bedouque School supporters  
have passed the following resolu-  
tion:

WHEREAS, there are now 50  
school fairs in the province, 20 in  
King's County, 22 in Queen's and  
8 in Prince. Under certain con-  
ditions the Government supplement  
any amount raised by the several  
fairs as follows: \$20.00 to each fair  
if they raise locally \$40 or over. If  
they raise less than that amount  
only one half of the amount so  
raised will be paid by the Govern-  
ment. They further give every fair  
\$15 in prizes for calves born since  
March, 1922; and,

WHEREAS, the school fair is  
justifying the purpose of its promo-  
tion in stimulating a higher ideal  
in connection with agriculture and  
especially of life on the farm, as  
compared with all other occupa-  
tions we realize that in order to at-  
tain the highest results on and  
from the farm so that the boy and  
girl may be content with and en-  
joy their work they must be edu-  
cated in agriculture, and we be-  
lieve the school fair is the right be-  
ginning for the children to that  
end. In order to carry on the fairs  
with greater efficiency more money  
is needed.

The annual exhibition in the  
province cost \$12,000—to be exact  
\$11,895. Of this amount \$4,545  
\$7,357 to the Provincial. We believe  
all these fairs have lost their edu-  
cational value; in fact, have de-  
veloped rather into days of sport,  
and that the grants can be used to  
far greater advantage in assisting  
and extending the work in connec-  
tion with the school fairs. The  
amount saved by withholding the  
grants from county exhibitions,  
\$4,545, a reduction in the grant to  
the Charlottetown Exhibition As-  
sociation of \$2,500, the grants now  
given to the fairs by the Govern-  
ment and the amount raised locally  
would give every school fair in  
the province over two hundred dol-  
lars annually. It is important that  
in every community where school  
fairs are held that there should be  
built (where there is none at pres-  
ent) an up-to-date public hall,  
where the long winter evenings  
could be spent profitably in lectures  
upon agriculture, child welfare,  
public health, and other hundreds  
of subjects, where women's insti-  
tutes would have a home, where  
debates and entertainments could  
be held as well as a permanent  
place for holding school fairs.

WHEREAS, such a program as out-  
lined would give every school fair  
management, but with the women and  
their institutes all this is feasible,  
practical and desirable.

WHEREFORE RESOLVED THAT  
we request the Government to dis-  
continue all grants to county and  
local fairs in the province, except  
the Provincial and reduce the grant  
to it to \$5,000 for the year 1923 and  
divide the amount among the  
school fairs.

**Alexander Zaimis  
Head of New  
Ministry in Greece**

(Special to The Guardian.)  
ATHENS, Oct. 1.—Alexander  
Zaimis, who was Premier when  
Constantine was expelled from  
Greece in 1917, and whose father  
headed the Greek cabinet when  
King George I was dethroned by  
the revolution of 1832, has been  
selected to head the new ministry  
which is composed of independ-  
ents, Venizelists and military offi-  
cers.

**New Cabinet Sworn in on Friday  
Afternoon.**

PARIS, Oct. 1.—A despatch to  
the Havas Agency from Athens,  
says the new cabinet of Premier  
Zaimis was sworn in yesterday  
afternoon.

The executive committee has  
conferred with the chiefs of all  
the political groups in an effort  
to determine the national will.

A Number of Former Government  
Leaders Arrested.

The arrest of a number of for-  
mer government leaders is de-  
scribed as being due to a desire  
to impose justice as an example  
to future possible offenders. One  
allegation put forward is that  
while in power these leaders re-  
fused to listen to the advice of  
Great Britain, that so long as Con-  
stantine was allowed to remain  
on the throne the cause of Greece  
was hopeless.

**Coal in Saskatchewan**

The coal deposit at Lampman,  
Sask., Canada, is believed to be  
one of the best of its kind in the  
world and one of the greatest as-  
sets of the province, according to  
the investigators who recently  
made an examination of the loca-  
tion. They estimated that there  
are 32,000,000 tons of coal in the  
two and three-quarter sections of  
land in which the coal is located.—  
Scientific American.
