"Billy" Disch Has Won His Fourteenth Pennant

AUSTIN, Texas, June 15.—William J. ("Billy") Disch, veteran Texas University baseball mentor and the man who prepared Bib Falk for the big show, has just won another Southwest Conference Championship.

Winning baseball championships long ago became a habit with the "Old Man," as he is respectfully termed by thousands of alumnus and students of the institution. In the sixteen years he had coached orange and white diamond combinations, he had landed the big prize—fourteen times.

In the fall of 1910 Disch was brought to Texas University because the university students and supporters were weary of seeing their line thrashed so often by the St. Edward's College which Disch coached for a number of years. St. Edward's was then and is now a much smaller school than Texas University.

His first season, that of 1911, Disch failed to lead his team to a championship, but he has not failed since, except in 1924, when Toddy Lyons, now one of the aces of the Chicago White Sox, pitched Baylor University of Waco to the title.

The Texas Longhorn coach is generally recognized a master of baseball. His insistence on clean living and high standards of general conduct is credited with being one of the major reasons for his unusual success.
