DAUGHTER OF A BRITISH COLONEL DIES BY POISON

Useless to Merely Live, Her Pittance Yielding No Amusement.—Death Her Only Escape From a Life of Toil—Gently Reared Girl Tried to Make Both Ends Meet on \$7 a Week, But Found it Too Hard a Task to Live.

Dear Brother: I regret to do this, but it is the only way that I can escape the misery of my present life. You know that to make both ends meet I must live in a furnished room. I hate, wear cheap clothes and cook what I can afford to buy to eat. There is no use living when one has to work until there is not enough to go to bed every day and even then have poor clothes, a poor furnished room and no pleasure. My only hope was that I could save enough money to go back to Barbadoes, but you know I couldn't.

LILLIAN
New York, October 25.—Such is the story of a virtuous girl killed by the great city.

Lillian Watkins—she was only twenty—died of poison yesterday in the cheap room that had worn out her life. They found her in her small bedroom in No. 380 West Eighteenth street peace at last on her face.

But she was one of the countless thousands. The daughter of a British Colonel, she was reared to that she could not endure the harsher life. She was very musical. But she did not know the meaning of work. And Lillian Watkins, who had lived in the gaudy and luxury of the high army class, in time found herself struggling for life in New York.

She worked at packing cracker boxes for \$7 a week. Her brother who came here from Barbadoes with her, took a place at \$8.50.

THE MURDER PLOT OF NEW YORK.
Then the bitter fight for existence began in earnest. It is a story with a heart pang in every line. It is the exposure of the murder plot of New York.

Consulting together they found that the man they were to earn would scarcely pay more than one day's hotel bill and they hunted for a furnished room, both full of hope and expecting to meet the god of fortune upon every corner of the crowded streets. They found rooms in the West Eighth street house. Some of the rooms they had looked at were impossible and absurd, but here was a room on the second floor that might be made fairly comfortable for the girl—the boy could rough it in a hall room on the floor. Lillian's room was \$4.00 a week, and she was to find herself on the remaining three dollars and what her brother could spare from his scant wages.

"I will cook my breakfast in my room," she said to her brother, "but we will dine together every night in a restaurant." The boy agreed and then the plot of the city was well under way. In the summer of 1903.

BUOYED UP HER BROTHER.
There was a meeting with a strange people in a wonderful place, where belts flew around swiftly revolving wheels and the roar of machinery was deafening.

The girl found herself a slave of a machine, a merciless master that cast boxes unceasingly at her feet and she had to pick them up and stack in even rows. It was only when the whistle blew at 12 o'clock, and at 5 that the machine ceased.

Tired physically, the girl sought her room in the evening, but her courage was beautiful and the brother was buoyed up by the sister's hopefulness and words of encouragement.

The evening was their own, and they dined together in a restaurant on Eighth avenue.

The first "pay day" came, an entirely new and delightful experience, and of her first week's salary the girl sent a five dollar bill back to the mother in Barbadoes, just to show her how easy it was to earn money in the wonderful city.

But soon the note that had first worried their ears and dazed their brains became a confused mumble of sounds and the pay days seemed further apart. The

furnished room smelled of the gas that escaped from the little stove, where coffee and eggs were cooked in the morning. The factory was a grind, a crushing weight to her reluctantly.

MUSIC LONG AGO GONE.
Music, light, flowers and the song of birds was forgotten. To write a cheerful letter was a miserable task and a task, but one that must be attended to. To talk of other than a faithful life and plain severance, and the kind to work in was madness. Pawn shops existed only in fairy tales and besides, what would the little bits of baby jewelry, rings and birthright presents that the girl had brought to New York, bring?

Lillian Watkins told her brother that they must save money enough to return to Barbadoes, where everything seemed so sunny and cheerful in comparison to great dreary, unsympathetic New York where they had friends to make the nights happy and a mother to cherish them, though their friends were ever so scant.

All the history of her family often came up before her as the two sat unhappy and discouraged at their dinner.

Years ago the younger son in an old English family had a commission bought for him, an annuity set aside and was launched in life with a full kit of brilliant uniforms, gold spurs and polished boots. With the unsolicited aid of his family he was married to an English girl, when he had earned the colonel's shoulder straps. A day came to them twenty-eight years

Just before the girl could be called a woman, she went with the heat of a woman, when her father went to the club to live, and the whispered gossip of the little colony of Europeans had a morsel of gossip that Colonel Watkins and his wife had separated. Then there was scarcely enough money in the Watkins home to pay the small wages of the servants and buy food.

One year ago, killed by the tale of American gold and the ease of acquiring wealth in the wonderful New York, the young man and daughter left him to seek their fate.

The sky line of New York appalled them. The noise of the city almost drove them frantic. Soon their little supply of money ran low and they sought work, as thousands have before them when hard driven by adversity—"at anything." They were given places at the biscuit factory.

As the two sat at their evening meal a week ago the youth asked, not unkindly, "What's the use of keeping up this farce? You know, Lillian, that we haven't a chance to get back to Barbadoes," looks as though we have got to stick it, and do the best we can—work, and work hard, to make a living. Let's cut the dinner and we can buy things and cook them when we're hungry. That's the way we've got to live."

THEIR LAST SIMPLE FEAST.
The sister's eyes filled with tears and she made a feeble protest, but finally agreed that this night should be the last one for them to dine together. Like the music, beautiful gowns, theatre, opera and drives, this last tender throb of reality was to fade away.

Tuesday Lillian Watkins left the factory earlier than usual, turning away from her task, and walking out of the building. Her two hours of this and went to his sister's room when he returned home from work. He chatted for some time and then went to his own room and to bed.

Watkins had to get to work earlier than his sister and passing her door believed her to be sleeping and would not disturb her. It was later in the day that Miss Watkins was found lying upon the bed dead.

THE CITY'S CRIME COMPLETE.
The crime of the city of New York was complete and the victim at rest. The message in the letter that she buried she had carried with her.

Walter Watkins was frantic with grief when he heard of the death of his sister. He says he will try to have the body taken back to Bridgetown, Barbadoes, where they enjoyed the happiest moments of their life.

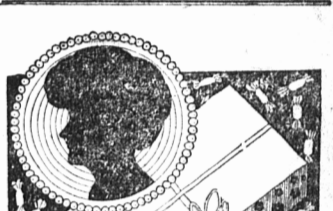
