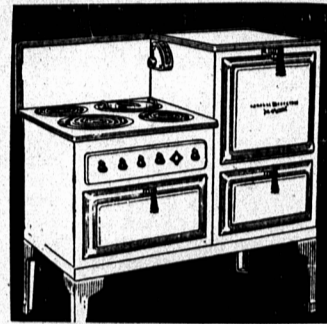

## Hot on Trail of Missing Secretary

HALIFAX, July 13—(G.P.)—A Canadian Mounted Police expressed confidence that they would arrest Francis I. Vane, missing secretary of a wealthy New England merchant, before another day dawned.

The red-coats had been watching for the tall Englishman since he was last seen at the Lenox estate of John Shepard, Jr., with \$25,000 in securities.

Tonight they disclosed a couple answering the description of the vanes had stopped at a local hotel early this week and had been trailed.

Vane and his wife were said to have left Palm Beach in advance of the Shepard family, arriving in Lenox in time to receive a package of securities mailed from the West Palm Beach bank.

Soon after Shepard charged his secretary with theft it was learned that \$15,000 of the securities had been cashed.

Search for the couple in Nova Scotia began last week-end when they were reported in West Arichat, Cape Breton, in a car bearing Florida number plates.

"Tonight the Mounted Police said the Florida plates had been discarded."

## Australian Trade Still Improving

CANBERRA, July 13—Recovery in earnings and profits of Australian industrial companies which characterized the balance sheets issued last year has been maintained this year. In most cases profits have shown a considerable increase on last year.

The improvement in profits has been most marked in companies associated with the shipping, building, and allied trades. The increased activity in building has been reflected in higher profits of brick manufacturing companies, iron and steel, cement production, and tile

## Austral Air-Mail Is Over-Popular

SYDNEY, July 13—The Australia-England air mail has proved so much more popular than was expected that the Qantas Empire Airways, which operates the Australian section of the route, has been forced to reduce accommodation for passengers and freight in their machines.

The company based its calculations for the early months of the air service on 200 lbs. of mail for each journey, but the last aeroplane took off from Darwin with 550 lbs. A consignment of 1374 lbs. of radio tubes and other electrical goods from Holland by K.L.M. Dutch Airways and Qantas Empire Airways has reached Australia. It cost the consignees \$5000 for freight.

## Wedgeood Clay Came From Sydney

SYDNEY, July 13—Mr. G. T. Wedgwood, who is of the sixth generation of the famous family of English potters, has disclosed in Sydney an interesting link between the founder of his family and Australia.

The first piece of Australian clay to be used on the potter's wheel was shaped by Josiah Wedgwood, in 1789. It was dug from the shore of Sydney Cove a year after Captain Cook discovered and landed at Botany Bay.

From it Wedgwood produced a medallion from a design, it is believed, by Flaxman the sculptor. It was mounted on a plaque which bore some lines by Erasmus Darwin, grandfather of the celebrated Charles Darwin, dedicated to Sydney Cove.
