GUNNER REX KIELLY.

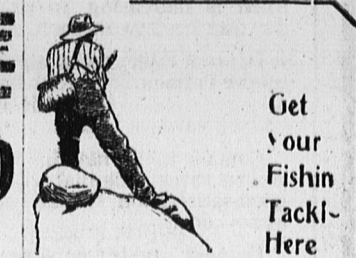
Mrs. C.W. Kielly, Kent Street, City, received a telegram yesterday notifying her that her son, Gunner Rex Kielly, of No. 2 Siege Battery, (formerly the 98th) had been admitted to Bradford War Hospital on May 29th wounded. He is a brother of the late Lance-Corporal Ray Kielly of the 4th Battalion, who was killed in action last September. It is sincerely to be hoped that Gunner Kielly is not seriously wounded and that news of his recovery may soon be received.

PRIVATE FRED S. MATTHEWS

A telegram was received by Mr. George M. Matthews, O'Leary, on Saturday, announcing the sad intelligence that his brother Private Fred Stewart Matthews had been killed in action on May 16th. The deceased was born at Baltic, Lot 18, P.E.I., thirty years ago. He had been living in Western Canada for a number of years previous to enlisting. He joined the 67th Battalion Western Scots, a Victoria B.C. regiment, shortly after the war broke out, and had been through some of the heaviest engagements on the western front. He leaves to mourn seven brothers and four sisters,—his death causing the first break in a family of twelve. Another brother, Pte. John A. Matthews, is now serving with the 104th.

WAR RELIC.—Interesting souvenirs of the war are shown in the window of Messrs Reddin Bros., window—a German gas helmet and the case for containing same when not in use. The helmet was sent home by Gunner J. W. McCarron of the 88th Siege Battery and was found on a dead German soldier. On the bottom of the metal case is a bullet hole which may have been made by the bullet which cost the German his life.

THE LATE ALEX. TURNBULL.—The Guardian has received the following further details of the death of the late Andrew Turnbull of Charlottetown. He was about forty-five years of age and a son of the late Andrew Turnbull, of this city, not John as previously stated. He was a miner and lived in Back Mines, Stellarton, N. S. He was killed on the railway track a short distance south of Lunenburg (near Stellarton) station. It is supposed he was walking along the track and was struck about 8.30 p. m., by a shunter. His body was cut in two and badly mangled. He leaves a widow and six children. An inquest was held and a verdict rendered as follows: "Accidental death, and no blame attached to anyone."

Leslie had been killed in action. Jack was one of Consorts boys who enlisted with the 56th and left Calgary in March a year ago. He was possessed of a very sunny disposition, and was seldom without a smile on his lips, so customary was this trait that he became known as Happy Jack Leslie, and many said "He will surely go through the war as because of his happy-go-lucky way and manner." But bullets make no choice and while in the thick of battle on Easter Monday Jack was seen by a comrade, one moment with the usual smile and the next moment he was dead. How sad, and yet in a way how beautiful.

Robt. G. Ingersoll said, "I have one sentiment for soldiers, living and dead. Cheers for the living, Tears for the dead," but we have two sentiments for every soldier living or dead. They are Cheers and Tears for both; for the Living Cheers for their Victory, Tears for the wounds, hardship and sorrow they bear. For the dead, Cheers for their glorious death, Tears that they were compelled to die. Yet who could choose a better death. No weary years of sickness and sorrow, no more war, the battle may go on and on, earth run red with blood, bullets whistle, cannons roar, yet all is serene and quiet. He sleeps beneath the tearful willows in the land whose freedom he was helping to save. Care-free and careless of sunshine and storm, Happy Jack Leslie.

PTE. FREDERICK MATHESON

Mr. Joseph Matheson, of Oyster Bed Bridge, has received a telegram conveying the sad news that his only son, Private Frederick Matheson officially reported killed in action, on April 30th, 1917.

Private Matheson enlisted in March, 1916, with the 105th Battalion, being later transferred to the 14th Royal Montreal Regiment, and was among the first to go to France.

Private Matheson was only 22 years of age, and was a splendid type of manhood. His many friends will learn with sorrow of his death. Letters received from him a few days before he was killed stated that he was in the big drive, and had come out of it without a scratch.

Dear Sir,—You have doubtless been informed before this of the death of Private F. Matheson, which occurred during an intense bombardment of April 30th, 1917. Private Matheson was a good soldier and I can assure you that his loss is felt keenly by all who knew him. Canada has lost a good soldier, and all of us a brave and gallant comrade.

We hope in the years to come when time will have somewhat softened this serious blow, the fact that Private Matheson died for his country may prove of some consolation to you.

I extend to you the sincerest sympathy of all ranks under my command.

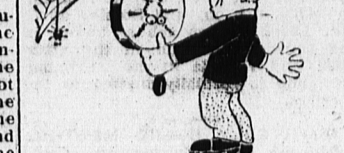

ALL THE MONKS OF RUSSIA TO BE SENT TO THE FRONT.

PETROGRAD.—(via London May 30)—All the monks of Russia will be sent to the front to serve in the department of sanitation, according to orders issued by the war ministry. Lay brothers will be recruited as soldiers.

Only recently the monks demanded equal political rights with the lay population, including the vote and they have been given other marked evidences of revolutionary zeal. Five hundred criminal prisoners in the province of Nizhni-Novgorod have petitioned the government that they be sent to join the army.

A special commission has examined and accepted three hundred of these who signed the petition.

A novel measure to suppress thievery in the soldiers' barracks has been put into practice in Petrograd. A captured thief was forced to walk along the Nevsky Prospect bearing placards with the inscription "I stole sugar and shoes from soldiers."
