VILLAGE AWAITS HIS "YOUNG LORD."

(By Dominion News Service.) PLYMOUTH, Devon, Oct. 4.—"Do you think the young lord will come back today like?"

The query, spoken with the burr of Devon, is the customary morning greeting between oldest inhabitants in this paradise village of Lower Ashton, which hides in the foothills of Dartmoor.

"The young lord" to Lower Ashton is Charles Ernest Fellow, seventh Viscount Exmouth, one-time professor of chemistry at a famous United States university, and still an American citizen, although a British peer.

He is sixty years of age, but to Lower Ashton his sixty years mean youth. When he is not "the young lord" they call him "young Charlie Fellow, our Viscount." The sixth viscount never claimed his title, but the seventh viscount is now crossing from America with his wife to claim his seat in the House of Lords—hence this excitement in Lower Ashton.

WAR HORROR IN JETS OF CURRENT

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, Oct. 3.—A new weapon of war has been invented by Professor A. M. Low, the scientist. It is an implement for throwing jets of water charged with electricity.

"This weapon," says Professor Low, is the Nineteenth Century and After, for September, "will render every cavalry obsolete, as horses can be electrocuted with far greater ease than men."

Professor Low hints at some of the possible uses of wireless in future warfare. He states: "I can at the present time by an expenditure of about three horse-power

destroy a wire at a distance of more than a yard without any connection at all. It is obvious that in the far future wireless power will be developed to such an extent that by momentarily diverting several thousand horse-power of a battleplane engine it will be possible to destroy aircraft within a few hundred yards. It may also be possible to destroy the delicate rigging of airplanes by wireless high frequency."

Professor Low adds: "It is quite possible that when civilization has advanced another century mental telepathy will exist in embryo, and will form a useful method of communication."

Family Windfall

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, Oct. 4.—Lord Glenconner's sale to an American of £20,000 worth of pictures from the collection of Sir Charles Tennant, his grand-father, will benefit 21 members of the Tennant family, in addition to himself. This is the effect of Sir Charles Tennant's will which provided that the proceeds of any sales of pictures or books should be paid "to my grandchildren, and children by my present wife in equal shares." Sir Charles has 16 children—12 by his first wife and 4 by his second. Three children of the second marriage are living, and in addition to Lord Glenconner, there are 12 grandchildren, sons and daughters of Sir Charles' first family. Each of these 21 members of the Tennant family will, therefore, receive a cheque for about £9,000. The list includes Princess Bibesco, formerly Miss Elizabeth Asquith, and her brother, Anthony, whose mother, Mrs. Asquith, was a daughter of Sir Charles.

Commits Suicide

(By Dominion News Service.) LONDON, Oct. 5.—Flight-Lieut. J. V. A. Bucknall, R.A.F., aged 30, drew an automatic pistol from his pocket and shot himself through the heart in the drawing-room of a Kensington flat, falling dead at the feet of a beautiful woman who had refused his proposal of marriage.

Lieut. Bucknall, who was stationed at Uxbridge R. A. F. depot, had been warned for foreign service, and was to have started for the East in a fortnight.

During the past two weeks he had made the acquaintance of Miss Chapman, an exceedingly pretty woman of thirty, who lives with her parents in a flat at Ivernagardens, Kensington.

Miss Chapman's parents have independent means. They spend most of their time travelling abroad, but stay in London for a few months each season. Both Miss Chapman and her father are artists of more than average ability.

The young flying officer made Miss Chapman's acquaintance two or three weeks ago. He became infatuated with her, and a few days after being introduced proposed marriage. Miss Chapman, however, gave no encouragement to his suit.

FAMOUS OUTLAW RUN TO NORTH

(By Dominion News Service.) BOMBAY, Oct. 4.—One of the most famous outlaws on the North-west Frontier of India—a man named Kalu—has just been captured in the hills of the Kohat district. For eight years he has been the terror of the Isa Khel tract, and a pest to the people and authorities of the Derajat. From his refuge in Mahsud country he has led most numerous raiding gangs to kidnap and loot in Isa Khel itself and neighboring villages. The boldness and skill of his leadership have been almost as phenomenal as his luck. Wounded more than once in engagements with pursuit parties, and escaping capture over and over again by the merest shave, he has led the forces of law and order many a long and exhausting dance through the hills. His last and one of his boldest exploits was to raid Kundian, on the east bank of the Indus in December last. This bold robber and murderer, for his hands are dyed deep in blood, has at last been captured by police in a running fight.
