LONDON, Jan. 18.—The Labor party today gave notice of its intention to move in the House of Commons a resolution congratulating the Russians on the formation of the constituent assembly. The resolution will say: "This House sends congratulations to the Russian people on the opening of the first constituent assembly, elected by a wide democratic franchise, and trusts that the establishment of the constituent assembly will result in the cessation of civil strife and the liberation of all forces making for national and international reconstruction."



**JEWISH EMIGRANTS SUFFER AND DIE**

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Five thousand Jewish emigrants chiefly women and children, on their way from Russia to America, are stranded between Harbin, Manchuria and Yokohama, Japan, and are in an appalling condition through sickness and want, according to a cablegram received through the state department by the Hebrew sheltering and immigrant aid society from Samuel Mason, who went to the far east to investigate their condition. The aid said today that Mr. Mason is empowered to take such steps as are required for the alleviation of the emigrants.

**NEW TRAIN ARRANGEMENT AND CAR FERRY SERVICE**

Sir—The change in the Railway Time Table which takes effect today requires some explanation. What is the necessity of continuing to send out the morning Express to Borden at such an unseemingly hour as 5.00 a. m. I venture the assertion that since the new service started on the 12th December connections at Sackville have not been made on an average of three times a week with the Ocean Limited going west or Train 18 going east. When these connections cannot be made why not have our outward train leave here at 8.00 a. m. and thus make connections with train 17 for St. John's which passes Sackville at 3.50 p. m. and a sure connection would also be made with The Maritime Express for Montreal and points west.

It would appear from the new change that the Car Ferry Steamer will still leave Borden about 9.00 a. m. and return leaving Tormentine about 1.40 p. m. and arriving here at 4.45 p. m. taking over three hours to go 43 miles and thus missing connection for Montague, Souris and all points east. This is not dealing fairly with the people of Kings County. Why is it necessary to take 3 hours as the schedule time to travel from Borden to Charlottetown on an Express train? The running time up to today was two hours and twenty minutes and in all conscience that was slow enough. It would appear that our Railway service is degenerating.

Here is a proposition which our Representatives and Boards of Trade should work for as a winter schedule. The train from Sackville arrives at Tormentine at 9.00 a. m., the Car Ferry could leave 35 minutes later and arrive at Borden about 10.15. The train for Charlottetown would then leave about 11.15 and should arrive here about 1.45 p. m. and thus make connections south east and west. The Car Ferry would leave Borden on return at 11.30 a. m. so that the train from Charlottetown to connect need not leave here before 8.00 a. m. As the train service is to be greatly reduced on the main land the above proposal should meet general approval and I could point out many other advantages that
