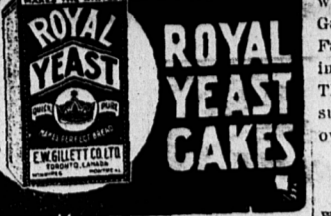

The meat and milk inspectors report was read, and out of the 22 cattle and 25 hogs slaughtered during the past month, one cow and one hog were condemned.—L.

Annual Report Abegweit Chapter I. O. D. E.

Officers for the year 1918-19:—Regent, Mrs. Neil McLeod; 1st Vice-Regent, Mrs. Neil McQuarrie; 2nd Vice-Regent, Mrs. Charles Rogers; Secretary, Mrs. L. A. Moore; "Echoes" Secretary, Mrs. E. T. Tanton; Educational Secretary, Miss F. H. Hunt; Standard Bearer, Mrs. H. H. Beer.

Since the last annual meeting held February 28th, 1918, five new members have been added to the Chapter, making a total of 64 members.

The total receipts for the year amounted to \$1,183.38 which was raised in various ways; such as entertainments, sales of food and flowers, dinners and collections, also a donation of \$100 from Miss Nora Holman for the French refugees and one of \$15.00 from Mrs. Bruce McKelvie.

During the year, under the direction of Mrs. Hacker, 200 pairs of socks have been made by the members and sent to boys in France.

In March, in place of the regular business meeting, Miss Holman gave a very instructive talk on her Red Cross work in London, and in September a special meeting was called to hear Mrs. Gardner, the organizer of the I. O. D. E. in the United States, tell of their work in Los Angeles.

During the year the Chapter maintained four prisoners of war.

At the time of the influenza epidemic a committee of the Daughters of the Empire was appointed by the Board of Health to arrange the work of a visiting nurse. There was also found to be great need of supply, beef tea and other food for invalids, and this work was undertaken by one of our members, Miss Gladys Holman. The women of the town responded most generously to this call, and during the height of the epidemic as much as ten gallons of beef tea and broth was distributed daily. The doctors co-operated with the committee, reporting each day cases needing nursing and supplies. About 300 visits were made by the trained nurse and her assistants, in all slightly over fifty patients were taken care of.

The Chapter also assisted in the Patriotic and Red Cross collection.

Report of the Educational Secretary:—The Chapter, having previously adopted three prisoners of war, it was suggested by the regent that the adoption of a fourth prisoner be undertaken by the school children. The children were delighted and gladly responded, often making a sacrifice to bring a little happiness to their prisoner. The regent also suggested that the children should contribute their share to the donation for Queen Mary's Guild (wounded soldiers and sailors) and again the response was generous. Prizes in money were offered by the Chapter last spring for the best gardens grown and tended by children up to the age of fifteen. Many splendid gardens were exhibited, so that, while the child was educating himself in market gardening he was also helping to supply the demand for greater production of food.

Perhaps what assisted the teacher most tangibly was the offer of a picture for each room by the Chapter. The children were asked to write an essay on some patriotic subject, whether on some historical event or on the life of a leading statesman or warrior, and the pupil writing the best essay had his name inscribed on the picture which will be hung in that department for all time. In this way the five senior grades are now provided with a beautiful historical picture each, and others are to follow.
