### SHOCKING TRAGEDY OCCURS AT BALTIC

#### Body Of Earl Hillman Found In Creek—Coroner Gives Verdict Of Accidental Drowning.

A shocking tragedy was discovered with the apparent purpose of low-  
ing Saturday afternoon at Baltic  
which has deeply grieved the whole  
community. Mr. Earl Hillman, a  
prominent citizen and owner of the  
saw mill there, had not been seen  
at the mill on Thursday but no  
dearly was felt concerning him. On  
Saturday afternoon Messrs. David O.  
Champion and Alexander McGougan  
were digging clams on the shore  
when they noticed a dry attached  
to a motor boat which was anchored  
in the creek and that there appear-  
ed to be no sign of anyone being  
aboard either craft. They decided to  
investigate the matter and on doing  
so found a rope tied to the motor  
boat and on starting to pull it in out  
of the water they were horrified to  
find that a dead body was attached  
to it.

They at once notified Mr. John-  
ston Bernard who telephoned to the  
coroner, Dr. E. T. Tanton of Sum-  
merside, and he instructed the men  
to bring the body to land and leave  
it on the shore until his arrival. Dr.  
Tanton viewed the body where it  
lay on the shore and held a thor-  
ough enquiry into the circumstances.  
The body was identified as that of  
Mr. Hillman, by his brother-in-law,  
Mr. Gordon MacKenzie and also by  
Mr. Champion, Mr. McGougan and  
others.

As there were not witnesses to the  
tragedy the exact manner of how  
Mr. Hillman met his death could  
only be arrived at by circumstantial  
evidence. This pointed to the fact  
that the deceased had tied a rope  
around the upper part of his body

### RED ARMY HAS INVADED MANCHURIA

#### Two Towns Occupied By Large Force Which Continues To Advance.

(Special to the Guardian)  
MUKDEN., Manchuria, Aug. 17.—  
Russia's Red army has invaded Man-  
churia with a large force, occupied  
two towns west of Manchuria and to-  
day continued to advance with the  
apparent intention of isolating the  
Manchurian railway junction, it was  
announced in an official communiqué  
here.

General Chang Hsue-Liang, War  
Lord of Manchuria and commander of  
the Chinese forces along the border,  
ordered his advance guards to  
resist the invasion. The Foreign Leg-  
ations at this capital of Manchuria  
have not yet been informed of the  
action of the Soviet army. The com-  
municé said the towns were occupied  
last night. Mukden officials re-  
turning from Manchuria said today  
there had been border clashes be-  
tween Chinese and Soviet troops  
throughout the week. Tsai Yun-Sheng  
one of the Chinese negotiators, re-  
turned to the border today and re-  
ported that there was a clash be-  
tween the patrols near Manchuria  
Tuesday, when the Russians crossed  
the Manchurian border in pursuit of  
certain Russians, who had been har-  
assing the Red soldiers and who it is  
said, were continually instigating  
border clashes.

SHANGHAI, Aug. 17.—China's  
War Department began today prepa-  
rations for a possible winter cam-  
paign against the Soviet after notifi-  
ng Kellogg Pact signatories that  
she would stand for no infringements  
of her territory and reserved the  
right of defending the nation.  
SHANGHAI, Aug. 18.—The mo-  
bilization of ten additional brigades  
of Manchurian troops totalling 100-  
000 men was reported late tonight  
in an official Kueimin News agency  
dispatch from Mukden. The agency  
said the national government viewed  
"the China-Russian crisis as in-  
creasingly serious."

Ings Cross collided in the North  
Sea, 30 miles off Humber early this  
morning.

### SNOWDEN TURNS DOWN OFFER

#### Compromise Offer Would Give Britain About Three-fourths Of The Increase De- manded In The Brit- ish Share of German Reparations.

(Special to the Guardian)  
THE HAGUE, August 17.—Philip  
Snowden, British Chancellor of the  
Exchequer, today turned down a  
compromise offer made by the French,  
Belgian, Italian, and Japanese dele-  
gates by which Great Britain would  
receive about three-fourths of the  
increase demanded by him in the  
British share of Germany's repara-  
tions under the account planned. In  
doing so he again asked, as he has  
been doing for the last ten days,  
that the apportionment of the  
Young plan annuities among Germany's  
creditors that the Allies bring great  
Britain's share into accordance with  
the Spa percentages. He firmly re-  
fused to consider any other settle-  
ment.

Snowden's refusal of the offered  
compromise has not yet been put  
into writing. It was made verbally  
by the Premier of Belgium who has  
been acting as go between in private  
negotiations between the British and  
Latin delegates, handed him a mem-  
orandum consisting of four typewrit-  
ten pages outlining the offer in de-  
tail.

### ALARMING NEWS POSITION OF FROM EGYPT GRAF ZEPPELIN

by the Daily Express, whose corres-

### Celebration At Uigg a Big Success

#### 100th Anniversary Of Found- ing Of Baptist Congregation Fittingly Celebrated Yester- day And Saturday.

The centennial celebration of the  
settlement of Uigg took place yester-  
day and Saturday.  
In the pleasant grounds of the  
famous Uigg School, a great con-  
course of people gathered on Satur-  
day afternoon. The time was spent  
in renewing old acquaintances—  
many of those present had come  
hundreds of miles, one at least more  
than a thousand miles. There were  
present sons and daughters of Uigg  
pioneers, ranging in age from one  
year to ninety two years of age—a  
wonderful reunion.

An excellent programme of ad-  
dresses was carried through by Rev.  
(Major) J. C. Martin, the presiding  
officer. Among those present and  
speaking were Sir Andrew McPhail  
and Dr. J. A. Gordon of Montreal,  
Rev. M. A. McLean of Virginia Mr.  
John S. Martin, and Mr. William  
McLeod of Bridgetown.

Following Sir Andrew McPhail's  
brief but keenly interesting address  
Dr. Gordon eloquently referred to  
the history of Uigg—taking the line  
"Three men whose influence has been  
greatest in my life," mentioning Rev.  
Samuel McLeod of sainted memory.  
William McPhail his greatest teacher,  
and the late Rev. Malcolm Mc-  
Leod; the greatest sight of his life,  
being his childish impression of a  
beautiful hillside road embowed in  
tall trees, as it was 78 years ago—  
and the greatest message of my life  
—the words of a dying father.

A delightful address, forwarded by  
Rev. D. G. MacDonald of Vancou-  
ver, was read by the chairman. A  
list of Uigg's great men and women  
was given by Mr. J. S. Martin, and  
some interesting incidents related by  
Mr. William McLeod.

A supper was served in splendid  
style by the ladies of the Uigg dis-  
trict.  
Rev. Donald Gordon McDonald,

whose fine address was read at the  
picnic, is a first cousin of Dr. J. A.  
Gordon, and was a predecessor in  
the pastorate of the Charlottetown  
Baptist Church.  
During Mr. MacDonald's pastorate  
the church burned over 40 years ago  
was constructed, and during Dr.  
Gordon's term of office the present  
building was erected.

### N. S. Opposition To Prohibition

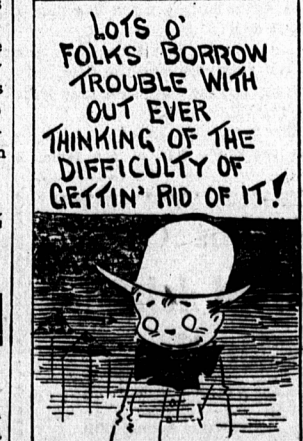
HALIFAX, Aug. 17.—The Halifax  
Chronicle is reliably informed that  
some twenty prominent Halifax citi-  
zens, including leading members  
of the medical and legal professions, and  
prominent business men, met recently  
to talk over the advisability of for-  
ming a Moderation League with a  
view to conducting a Province-wide  
campaign against the Nova Scotia  
Temperance Act.

These men, it is understood, are op-  
posed to the present law under which  
liquor is handled in Nova Scotia, on  
moral grounds. Their opposition to  
the N. S. T. A. is based on their con-  
tention that enforcement of the Act  
is farcical and practically impossible  
under existing circumstances. They  
submit, also, it is learned, that the  
present law has tended to make hypo-  
crites of the majority of the populace  
and that without public sentiment be-  
hind it, the law has become unenfor-  
cible and therefore useless.
