NEW YORK, Sept. 10 (AP)—With the help of a "cross-hair" error charged against Manager Earl C. St. Louis Cardinals clinched the Giants 5-1 today to breathe even more freely under the necks of the Dodgers in the roaring National League pennant race.

With Brooklyn losing to Chicago, the Cards moved up to within two games of the pace-setters through their own victory in which young Howie Pollet, the southpaw, served up a four-hitter.
