Federal Assistance To Forestall Increase In Fees Urged By S.D.U.

The Federal Government could, and we believe should, come to the assistance of our citizens and forestall the raising of educational fees by making a direct grant to the University, per capita for the students enrolled therein. It is suggested in the brief submitted yesterday to the Royal Commission on Arts by the faculty of St. Dunstan's University.

"If this is not done," the brief states, "then, inevitably, fees must be raised, and higher education will be available to a smaller group of our people."

The proposal of Federal assistance is advanced as a more effective method than the granting of complete scholarships at the undergraduate level, which would likely assist a comparatively small number.

"Such assistance would not infringe on the autonomy of the institution, nor interfere with provincial rights," the brief continues. "We make no suggestion as to the amount, nor the method involved; that could be best determined by you after your survey of the Canadian scene."

Lack of Industries

Emphasis is placed on the almost complete lack of industrial development in Prince Edward Island, which gives rise to the condition "that our most important export is young men and women." It is in the interest of all Canada that these young people should have a reasonably complete education before leaving.

"This education of young people for fields of art has always been a considerable problem," the brief states. In many instances these

young people cannot afford an education. So marked has this situation been that the burden of themselves took up the burden of assisting worthy young people to come to college, and have established burses, entirely outside our control, from their own resources, which burses partially defray the educational fees of 70 per cent of our Island students in College years.

"The admitted fact is, however, that fees must be raised to maintain services now in operation, and also to meet constantly arising new demands. Such action will immediately limit and restrict the number in this Province who can afford an education at the College level."

Nearing Century Mark

The brief subscribes to the recommendation submitted to the Commission last August by the National Conference of Canadian Universities.

"St. Dunstan's College," it points out, "is nearing its century mark. It has existed from its beginning without public assistance or endowment. It serves a community largely agricultural, whose average per capita income over that period has been very low. We feel that we have effected an important service to that community during those years in providing courses in arts and general science, as well as courses preparatory to professional training."

"We know that very many of the students who have registered with us would not, and many could not, have gone elsewhere in Canada for College education for obvious financial reasons. It has been our experience that our enrollment is directly proportional to the prices of farm produce."

C. F. A. Meeting

The crisis now facing Canadian farmers which has resulted from cancellation or reduction of export food contracts will be fully aired when the Canadian farmers parliament opens sessions at Niagara Falls next Monday. Special sessions of the National Hog and Poultry Producers committee will be held Tuesday evening. Rt. Hon. Mr. Gardiner will speak to the delegates on Tuesday afternoon.

Marketing Developments

According to press reports and communications from Ottawa during the past few days it looks as though the Dominion Government will assist producer marketing boards. Their small surpluses that upset our whole marketing structure can be removed and

moderate prices maintained. Although we may not get immediate relief it may be the best method in the long run.

Farmers or business people do not want the Government to meddle with marketing. But all are agreed that in the interests of our National economy the Government has a responsibility.

Provincial Brief Stresses Requirements of Industries

The need of making available more scientific knowledge to those engaged in the basic industries of fishing and agriculture in this Province, and to young people who are considering making either of these industries a life work, was strongly emphasized in the brief submitted yesterday to the Royal Commission on Arts, Letters and Sciences on behalf of the Provincial Government.

Science in its value to these industries should be brought to the people in the rural parts of the Island, the brief suggests. The desirable and essential knowledge could be provided by travelling instructors, who would give advice and instruction for a period of two or three weeks at central places in various communities. A similar system of visiting instructors might also include home economics or domestic science for young women.

Direct To The People

Scientific methods of production, preservation and marketing the products of two basic industries of the Province should be brought direct to the people concerned to replace outmoded ways, it is suggested. The value of such community scientific knowledge available in rural areas would be inestimable; not only in its material benefits, but in its giving to the young workers the realization that the agriculture and fishing industries,

to marketing boards which are being advocated and promoted by the Federation of Agriculture. We want to explain that the Federation is an organization of farmers and farm groups working in the overall interests of agriculture and farm people. It is independent of government, politics or business influences.

Our policy is not one of promoting Co-Operatives, Credit Unions, Institutes, etc., or of condemning or criticizing private enterprise. We believe in ownership both joint and private as the backbone of our whole system. And that a balance of their own resources and not on subsidies from government funds.

Music and Drama

Emphasis is placed on the place and value of music in the schools. More qualified instructors, it is suggested, should be available for rural schools and choral groups.

In drama there are in the Province many groups, organized in churches, rural communities, and dramatic clubs, which produce one or more plays a year for their members or for the public. Many of these performances are sponsored by the local Women's Institutes. An experienced and qualified visiting instructor in the elementary principles of play production, simple stage settings and lighting and in how to obtain the maximum effect at a minimum cost would be of great value to school and community, even if the instructor gave only a week or two of his time to each rural area or community centre.

"If Federal aid is given to provincial education, a grant for such an arrangement would seem to be justified," the brief states. "Dramatic groups would thereby improve their technique. The appeal of their work to the public would enable them to depend financially on their own resources and not on subsidies from government funds."

Library Facilities

Noting that the Province is relatively well provided with libraries, the brief suggests, as an urgent requirement, a reading room exclusively for boys and girls in the public library in Charlottetown.

More space which would provide accommodation for a combined museum and archives would be a valuable historical asset for preservation of precious material which may otherwise be lost.

Reference is made to the general improvement in homes of the Province, in gardens and rural beautification in the last few years. The work of the Women's Institutes in rural communities is commended in this connection. Also the work of the Provincial Chapter of the Imperial Order, Daughters of the Empire, in the matter of exhibition of historic relics and documents.

The brief points out that the Vocational Wrg. lately established on the Prince of Wales College grounds is intended to serve, not only as a centre for so-called practical activities, but also, with Prince of Wales College, to provide guidance and leadership for making science and the arts available to all. "They must be brought down from the secluded ivory tower to dwell among average men and women and to enrich their lives."
