P. E. I. Diocesan Board, Women's Auxiliary Meet

The semi-annual meeting of the P. E. I. Diocesan Board of the Women's Auxiliary, took place at Milton yesterday. A large number of members attended the service of Holy Communion in St. John's Church at 10:30. The Rt. Rev. John Hackenley, D.D., Bishop Coadjutor was the celebrant and also preached a most helpful and inspiring sermon. Other clergy present were the Rev. Canon Malone, Rev. H. D. Raymond, Rev. G. Westbrook, Rev. C. T. Spriggs. After the service, luncheon was served to the visitors by the ladies of the parish.

The business meeting opened at 2:15 p. m. with Mrs. Raymond, Diocesan President in the chair. Prayers were offered by the Rev. Bridgewater. Mrs. Hooper welcomed the visitors in a few well-chosen words. The roll call showed most of the parishes well represented. Mrs. Cosh read a paper on the changing conditions of the James Bay and how this affects the Indians. Civilization is fast breaking down barriers and the white men are invading the territories of the Indians. How to prepare the Indian to meet these changes is one of the great problems of the missionaries. One great hope lies in the Indian schools. Here the children learn much that is good and helpful. When they return to their people, they will be able to encourage them to persevere, and show them ways to do something towards self-support and independence. Mrs. Raymond said, let us remember as we see on the outskirts we are helping to send some Indian child to school to learn about Jesus Christ and to learn to become a useful citizen.

Mrs. Raymond spoke of the visit of the Dominion Executive in September, when it is hoped meetings can be arranged in different centres so that all members will have an opportunity of hearing a message from these visitors. She asked the members to pray that the Dominion Board be guided right in their deliberations at the annual meeting, and for prayers on behalf of the fellowship of the West movement. If we are to be a living church, we must have a broader vision and see beyond our own parishes and their needs.

Miss Lowe, Dio. Treasurer, spoke of the Pledge Fund and hoped all branches would make a special effort to meet their pledges this year. An interesting talk on social service in the Toronto district was given. The Dominion Board at the annual meeting this year is to consider the advisability of adding social service work to its list of activities. After a number of resolutions were passed, the meeting closed with hymn and prayers.

Tea was served before the members left for home. A vote of thanks was extended the Rev. G. Westbrook for his hearty welcome and to the ladies for their hospitality.

An enjoyable day was spent by all and we have much to think and pray about during the summer months, when perhaps we shall not, as branches, be meeting so frequently.
