### THE GOVERNORSHIP

The five years term of Lieutenant Governor McIntyre expired on 23rd May last and there was some expectation that a new appointment would be then made. We believe that His Honor then expected to vacate Government House and make room for his successor. But Parliament was in session, there was no immediate urgency for a new appointment and there were a number of names to be considered. So the matter was held over till the end of the session. It was confidently expected by many that an announcement would be made on Saturday last, but our representatives have returned from Ottawa apparently without agreeing upon a definite recommendation and we

learn that there is little probability of any appointment in the near future.

Recently the motion of a "second term" for Governor McIntyre has got afloat and we believe is causing some anxiety among the leading aspirants for the position. Of course, if those responsible for a new appointment cannot agree upon a choice, the nearly three months already elapsed will lengthen into six, and the six months into an indefinite extension. Governments with many difficult matters to dispose of are often disposed to take the line of least resistance, which in this case appears to be that of doing nothing. Too much public business is thus left at loose ends. We think the uncertainty ought to be terminated either by a new appointment or a definite announcement that no appointment will be made. This course is the only one that is at once fair to Governor McIntyre and to those others who have reasonably aspired to succeed him. In any case "possession is nine points" in the case and a Governor once in possession holds office until his successor is named.

A correspondent directs the attention of The Guardian to the matter of violation of law and the Sabbath by the working trains of the Railway which he affirms were hauling clay to the bridge all Saturday night down to six o'clock yesterday morning. Public sentiment will not easily tolerate a repetition of this offence, should it be attempted.
