FIGHT TO SAVE "PEACE ROOM" AT PORTSMOUTH.

PORTSMOUTH, N. H., April 8.—Owing to the plan of several Navy Yard officials to destroy the historic "Peace Conference Room" in the building where the negotiations for ending the war between Russia and Japan were discussed and carried out, a storm of indignation has arisen that will make such a move an impossibility.

The different patriotic organizations in and about the city have taken hold of the matter and will confer with the powers-that-be to head off the movement.

BIG SENSATION IN NEWFOUNDLAND.

NEW YORK, April 8.—A despatch from St. John's, (Nfld.), to the New York Times says:—

"Dissatisfied with his share of the proceeds of a timber deal, Ralph St. John has made public an agreement and correspondence disclosing methods by which a syndicate of American and Newfoundland speculators, obtained control of timber areas along the coast of Labrador aggregating 13,853 square miles in the past two years, from the government of Newfoundland, without other payments than rentals required under the crown lands act.

The group consists of Charles D. Stanford, Roscoe H. Wing, of Bangor, (Me.); Edwin Merrill, Frederick W. Whitridge, of New York; Charles W. H. Tessier, Ralph Strong, Hon. Donald Morrison, of St. John's, minister of Justice, and a member of the executive council in that government, of Sir Edward Morris.

Registration shows that the company is rated, with a capital stock of \$50,000, all of which is held by the above group. No cash was paid, for the stock, nor any owed on it, and no considerations are due upon it, but all the shares are regarded as fully paid and non-assessable.

It is estimated that the valuation of the timber limits, according to the prospectus last year, is \$22,400,000. Rentals amounting to over \$70,000 and a considerable sum over and above, are said to have been paid the vendors.

Mr. Strong, who was Mr. Morrison's agent, not satisfied with the treatment accorded him, is said to have sold information to Mr. Morrison's political opponents and to have given them agreements and correspondence as to the modus operandi of the group, which was a relay of applications to the crown lands departments for areas, which when obtained by men of straw were turned over to a syndicate for a consideration. They thus acquired the control of an enormous tract of 8,965,920 acres.



OYSTER CULTURE

(Continued from page 1.) when the beds became depleted thro overfishing and thro lack of tho will of the future on the part of the fishermen. The removal of oyster mud by the farmers had contracted the areas and there was nothing done to counteract the causes tending to the decline of the industry in the way of re-stocking beds as was done in other countries.

P. E. I. oysters are well adapted to produce an oyster of great value commercially, commanding a large price. The soil should not be soft mud or moving sand. The bed should be located where there is hard sand, no mud, a tidal flow and an absence of crab, mussel, etc; where there is 4 or 6 feet of water at low tide. Ice must not rest on the bed. The oyster must be protected from the weather. As to the stock, a removal improves the oyster in flavor or size. Plant in the spring in shallow water, they grow faster in summer, and being susceptible to light and heat will do well in shallow water. If planted in the autumn they will not likely thrive as they won't be climatized before winter and if they would they grow but little. Have a care to secure fresh stock, separated from stores, shells, etc, to which they may have attached themselves, as they grow better singly. Young or small stock is preferable, as that variety is unlikely to die.

The spat settles in immense quantities and the proper cultch should be deposited to catch it. This should be oyster, cockle, or clam shells, should be clean and deposited just a short time before spat falls. Oyster shells should be laid in the bench to dry thoroughly before being deposited and then they prove the best spat catchers. He cited the methods in this respect adopted by American cultures.

Much valuable information was disseminated in the subsequent informal discussion. Capt. Kempt and W. P. Tidmarsh each proving themselves thoroughly acquainted with the topic. The latter suggested that the Government by giving a reasonable grant and a right of perpetuity to any company proposing to start oyster culture here, offer an inducement for them to start. Then, by force of example, P. E. Island people could learn and adopt the methods used.

The information imparted at last night's meeting was of such a nature as to create a great interest in one of this provinces most profitable resources and that great good will materialize is certain. Capt. Kempt's paper was well prepared, comprehensive with the salient features of the topic well set out and was well read. That it was highly appreciated can be granted but the heartily expressed vote of thanks presented offers proof of this.

calm weather the young oyster thrives best as they are delicate and susceptible to the cold.

Oyster areas should not be fished as soon as the season opens. Get orders first and then fill them, send out first good samples and well raddi so that customers can place dependence on their supply.

The close season should be well observed, the oysters are then really unfit for food. It was just as improper to fish through the ice.

It would be necessary to alter the present regulating act to give a longer season if oyster culture were introduced. This would give time to overhaul the beds and clean them of shells, weeds and vermin.

He then gave important facts as to the rental of areas in other countries where culture was the chief source.

He favored the plan of giving the party acquiring an area, a fresh title and demanding a royalty on the output, if leased for a number of years at the end of that time the occupant might deplete the area.

There were three things to consider, capital, labor and experience and he could add patience. He cited the amount of oyster seed imported by Rhode Island which exceeded the native seed used to show the value of changing. He closed by stating that he felt "the industry if given the proper impetus will gradually expand and bring the quantity produced up to the figures of thirty years ago. Let us hope so." (applause)

A hearty vote of thanks was moved by R. H. Jenkins, seconded by E. T. Higge and tendered by the President and was gratefully acknowledged by Capt. Kempt who also expressed his readiness to answer any queries on the subject.
