OTTAWA, Aug. 24.—That Stefansson, the explorer, was safe on May 7, 1916; that he is carrying out his original plans, and that he has found an unknown land in the far north is indicated by a brief despatch the Naval Service Department has received from Nome from Dr. Anderson. The despatch is as follows: "Starkerson reported Stefansson safe on northwest coast of his reported land, May 7, 1916. Polar Bear, Mary Sacks and North Star safe. Starkerson was one of the men who made the trip north with the explorer when it was believed he was lost. He accompanied him north last year and it is supposed has returned south on some mission. The three vessels named are those Stefansson has with him. Stefansson on his first trip north sighted a new land, but was unable to visit it. His plan on the last trip was to explore this land which Stefansson believed would prove to be a second Greenland. NORTH BAY, Ont., Aug. 24.—The Tenskamung and Northern Ontario Railway officials report that bad brush fires are still raging around New Liskeard. In Hudson Township it is reported that twenty farmers were burned out, with a total loss of buildings, and stock, but up to the present no lives have been reported lost in that section.
