IN MEMORIAM

MR. J. D. McLEOD.

The death occurred Saturday morning at his late residence on Queen Street, Charlottetown, of an old and respected former business man of this city, Mr. John D. McLeod. He died at the advanced age of 82 years. Mr. McLeod was a native of this Province, having been born at New London. He came to Charlottetown when a boy and had a successful business career, for a long time conducting one of the largest and best grocery businesses in the city on the site where the Canadian Bank of Commerce is at present situated, only, of course, the building in which the Bank is carried on is not that in which Mr. McLeod's business was conducted, having been built since.

Six or seven years ago, subsequent to the death of his wife whose end was precipitated by a fire which occurred in their residence in 1909, Mr. McLeod gave up business and retired to live in the place of his boyhood days, New London. But afterwards his health began to fail him, and he found it necessary on that account to come back to Charlottetown, where he has been living for the past two years, with his sister Barbara. A few weeks ago Mr. McLeod's condition began to get weaker and Saturday morning the end came.

The deceased was an upright and straight-going man in all his dealings—qualities which won him universal respect and liking, though he was rather of a retiring disposition. His demise therefore is deplored by a large circle of friends.

Mr. McLeod married a Miss Emily McEwen, but they had no children. His wife, having, as already stated, predeceased him some years ago, the principal mourners are his three brothers (two of whom are in Kansas and the other in Alberta) and his sister Barbara who was with him when he breathed his last.

At three o'clock in the afternoon a short funeral service was conducted at the house by the Rev. Dr. Fullerton, and Mr. McLeod's remains were then removed to the railway station where they were conveyed by train to Kensington and thence to the old family homestead in New London, where the funeral will take place this afternoon at two o'clock.

SUCCESSFUL TRIALS WITH A SELF RIGHTING FLYING MACHINE.

VILLA COUBLAY, France, Aug. 15.—The new self-righting flying apparatus, invented by Lieutenant J. W. Durne, a retired British army officer, underwent most successful trials here yesterday in the presence of Brigadier-General Auguste Hirschauer, commander of the aerial corps of the French army. Major Julien Pellet, a French army aviator, was the pilot. He ascended in a high, gusty wind, considered too strong to face by the other aviators present. The apparatus displayed a degree of stability which drew expressions of amazement from all the expert witnesses. From time to time Major Pellet removed his hands from the levers and held them above his head to show the automatic equilibrium of the machine, which retained a perfect level, even when it encountered eddies, air pockets, or squalls.

WEATHER THE TEMPERATURE TIDE, MOON ETC

(Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Aug. 18.—Moderate to fresh southerly, shifting to westerly and northwesterly winds, very warm showers or thunderstorms in most localities.

THE WEATHER.—Yesterday was cloudy with thunder showers in the morning, cloudy in the afternoon and at night. On Saturday it was clear and very mild with light showers at night.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was seventy-one degrees above zero and the lowest was sixty-six above. The lowest the previous night was sixty-three above. At nine a. m. it was sixty-seven and at nine p. m. sixty-six above. The tide will be high this morning at 11.32 and tomorrow at 12.16; it will be high tomorrow morning at 12.33 and Wednesday at 1. The sun sets this evening at 7.06 and tomorrow at 7.04; it rises tomorrow morning at 5.04 and Wednesday at 5.05.

The moon rises tonight at 7.56. The moon was full on Saturday, August 16th, at 4.37 p.m. The last quarter of the moon will be on Sunday, August 24th, at 8.18 p.m. The length of today will be fourteen hours and four minutes.
