

More Apples Needed For Red Cross Jelly

A meeting of the Jelly Committee, presided over by Mr. D. J. Bennett, was held at the Red Cross House yesterday morning to complete the arrangements for the making of two tons of apple jelly for shipment overseas.

More than 120 bushels of apples will be required and to date only one-tenth of this amount has been received at Red Cross House. The committee realizes that farmers are particularly busy at this time of the year and that help is difficult to secure.

One of the outstanding examples of Boy Scout salvage work is that offered by the Scouts of Woodville, Alta., with the help of members of the Group Committee.

Notwithstanding the war Great Britain continues plans for increased output of vital raw materials. A new camp site, Bradley Wood, of 44 acres near Huddersfield, was recently opened by Sir Percy Everett, the Deputy Chief Scout, in the presence of the Mayor of Huddersfield, 2,000 Boy Scouts and Wolf Cubs.

As we will all shortly have completed our training as wireless operators and be sent from London to join our ships — as soon as possible we hope — you can imagine the great delight with which we shared this, one of our last few luxuries before leaving for the somewhat more austere life at our various Port Divisions.

A ted in the Mddexes, England, hospital has been named after the 10th Marylebone Rover Scout Crew, in recognition of the valuable service rendered at the hospital by them since the outbreak of the war.

"Dig for Victory" gardens operated in Britain by Boy Scouts have this summer been growing vegetables from Canadian seeds contributed by Scouts across the Dominion.

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The Camp Chief of the world's greatest gathering of boys, the Coming-of-Age International Jamboree of the Boy Scouts, held at Birkenhead in 1929, is dead. He was Brig-General George Fausch, C.B., C.M.G., F.S.A.

The D'ominion's largest annual Sunday youth rally and patriotic service is that sponsored by the Boy Scouts, Girl Guides, Boys' Brigade and other youth organizations of Hamilton, Ont.

In peace times the training in self-reliance, sportsmanship and general good citizenship provided by the Scouts is important.

Following is the roll of the world's first Boy Scout Troop organized at a camp on Brownsea Island, Dorset, on July 25, 1907.

The sole surviving member of the camp staff, "P. W. Everett," now Sir Percy Everett, and still active in Scouting as Deputy Chief Scout, paid a visit to Canada shortly before the war.

One of the first contributors to the "Baden-Powell House" fund being raised in Great Britain was James Harvey of Poole, the boatman who ferried the lo-be Scouts to Brownsea Island.

"There were long blasts from the ship's whistle. Distress flags were run."

"Almost immediately a destroyer and a cruiser started racing to our rescue. Large cargo nets were swung over the side of the burning transport. We began clawing at the ropes of the net as though it was a rope ladder.

"Some of the men fell from the net into the water, but were still light and Navy men quickly pulled them from the water onto the destroyer. I don't believe any of the passengers were lost but I am sure a lot of the crew must have been burned, the fire spread so fast.

"At the time of her launching the Wakefield, then the Manhattan, was the largest ship ever built in the United States, 24,209 gross tons. She had eight decks and a passenger capacity of 1,300 persons.

Early in the war the ship figured in the repatriation of Americans stranded in Europe.

"Then I saw a thin wisp of smoke and, like a lot of others I thought somebody's mattress had caught fire from a cigarette and that they probably would throw the mattress overboard.

"While I was looking, probably only a matter of two or three minutes, the smoke and fire seemed to race from one end of the transport to the other and completely enveloped the ship.

"We were headed into the wind and the skipper quickly hoisted the
