WILL NEVER RACE AGAIN

Jake Magin Forced to Get Out of the Six-Day Grind

NEW YORK, Dec. 9.—Jake Magin of Irvington, N. J., professional bicycle racing star for more than 15 years has pedaled his last six-day race.

The veteran was forced out of the 35th international six-day grind at Madison Square Garden this week as a result of heart trouble and physicians asserted he never again would be able to withstand the grueling pace of another campaign.

Magin made his first appearance in a six-day race in 1910. He has been victorious five times, twice with Alfred Goulett and once with Reggie McNamara at Madison Square Garden and twice at Chicago with Eddie Madden as his partner.

In the six-day race last March Magin sustained injuries that kept him out of competition for months when he rode over the high bank of the Garden saucer.

Magin was born in Philadelphia. He is 36 years old.

46 HORSES GO FOR \$29,985 AT GLORY SALE

LEWINGTON, Ky., Dec. 9.—Forty-six racehorses were sold at the Kentucky Sale Company's auction last week. The sale brought an aggregate of \$29,985. Many of the thoroughbreds offered were poor ones, and only very low bids were received on the majority.

The star of the sale was Triad, a daughter of Star Shoot, who going to R. W. Estill for \$11,600, after spirited bidding. It is reported that Estill was bidding for the account of John E. Madden.

PATRIOT TAKES DOUBLE HEADER ON SATURDAY

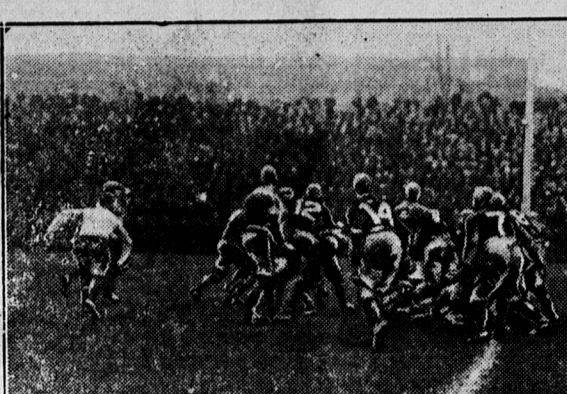
From Guardian in the First of Series of Bowling Matches in Second Class
