LEMONS USED FOR FOOD AND MEDICINE

There are few fruits which contain so many domestic virtues as the lemon, and yet apart from its use as a flavoring medium and as a preservative of the many branches of culinary arts, the familiar yellow fruit meets with but scant appreciation by women of this country, says the London Daily Times.

The extracted juice has invaluable soothing qualities for persons suffering from throat and chest troubles. One of the homeliest, but not on that account to be despised, remedies for a cold is to drink a glass of lemonade as hot and as strong as it can be swallowed when in bed at night. A profuse perspiration follows, and provided the remedy is taken in time it is a famous cure.

Lemon juice and honey are beneficial for coughs. The ordinary method is to mix the juice of the fresh fruit with equal parts of honey, but the better plan is to bake a large lemon in the oven until it is thoroughly soft, and then add sufficient strained honey to the pulp to produce a thick syrup.

This should be kept warm and a teaspoonful taken every quarter of an hour will greatly relieve the patient. Pure glycerine may be substituted for the honey.

An old stillroom recipe for the alleviation of an obstinate sore throat is as follows: Strain two teaspoonfuls of lemon juice into a wine glass, add the broken yolk of a new laid egg, then more juice, the yolk to be swallowed without beating the mixture.

Golfers and women who indulge in outdoor exercises are often worried with tired and swollen feet. They will derive much relief if they rub their skin with equal parts of lemon juice and alcohol, well blended. The most obstinate corn can be cured, it is said, by the application

A small bottle of fresh lemon juice should be kept on every toilet table. It is useful to allay irritation caused by the stings and bites of flies and insects. A dash of it in water forms an excellent mouth wash, whitening the teeth, preventing the formation of tartar and sweetening the breath.

The following is a simple recipe for a shampoo: Extract the juice from two lemons and boil this with the peels for ten minutes. Strain the juice into two ounces of salts of tartar, add two quarts of warm water and a few drops of any approved perfume. Use as an ordinary shampoo wash and note the beneficial effect on the hair and skin.

Women who are inclined to be "too, too solid," or who suffer from rheumatism or torpid livers, should take the juice of half a lemon squeezed into half a tumbler of water (without sugar) every morning instead of the customary early tea.

Two or three slices of lemon in a cup of hot tea (without the addition of milk) will often cure a nervous or sick headache, and many people find that munching a lemon is an excellent preventive of train or sea sickness.

The lavish use of lemon juice need not necessitate the waste of the peels. Thinly sliced and boiled in the same way as oranges for marmalade, the result is a delicious and refreshing preserve for the breakfast and teatables.

REV. DR. ARCHIBALD IS MODERATOR OF SYNOD

Thursday night. The regular work this morning was preceded by conference on Evangelism Reports of Presbyteries were received followed by discussion on evangelistic methods.

Rev. J. M. Melnis, of Halifax, spoke on the "Determining Factor in Evangelism." In the afternoon an address was delivered by Principal McKinnon.

At the meeting of the foreign Missions Committee Rev. Mr. McDermid, Moncton Presided. The estimates for the coming year were prepared to be submitted to the Synod to-day. The reports were received from Committee appointed to attempt to get men for the fields. A suitable man was decided on and a call will likely be extended. Dr. Jameson and Harvey Morton of the Trinidad Mission, were present and addressed those present.

The Foreign Mission Committee will meet again before Synod is concluded.

The Synod Committee of Sabbath School work met at 2.30, Rev. C. J. Crowdie, the Convener, presiding. Addresses were given by Dr. Duncan, General Editor of the Sabbath School Association. These addresses emphasized the importance of teacher training and graded lessons.

In the general discussion which followed Rev. G. R. Strathairn, A. H. Foster, J. W. A. Nicholson, A. M. McLeod, and J. H. Brownell, took part.

Then followed an interesting meeting under the auspices of the Synod Committee on Evangelism which was addressed by Principal McKinnon who spoke on "Some Ministerial Problems", the outcome of the experiences of ministers he had met in Western Canada.

The business Committee met in the afternoon, Rev. Dr. Stewart of the Presbyterian College, Halifax, in the chair.

Young Peoples' Societies.

Members of the Synod held a conference called by the Committee on Evangelism, in the forenoon, Rev. Anderson, Rogers, of Halifax, Chairman of the Committee, presided. After devotional exercises, the Chairman delivered a brief address, regarding the manner in which Ministers prepare for the day's work. A half hour's informal discussion then followed in which a number of Ministers gave their experience on what had been done in Evangelism in their own Churches during the year.

At his conference Rev. D. C. Ross of Trenton, reported on the evangelistic services held in that place and surrounding towns, relating some wonderful experiences of the conversion of sinners and reporting much good accomplishment.

Ernest Forbes spoke on the same work in New Glasgow, where the services were attended with good results although at first they did not appear to be effective.

Mr. McPherson of Cape Breton, William McLeod of Harmony, and Mr. McNair of Westville, were the next speakers. Mr. McNair spoke of the preparation for the work and said the series of meetings were rather disappointing, but not altogether without sunshine. It helped the Sunday School and the singing of the congregation. He considered the ways of American evangelists not altogether suited to our conditions.

After some remarks by Dr. Duncan of Toronto, Rev. Malcolm McPherson, of Harvey, N. B., said much good had been done in the St. John Presbytery, through the evangelistic services. They had left a new spirit and a new impetus in the congregations.

John Calder of Cape Breton, had something to say respecting the causes of the prejudices against evangelism of a certain kind. He thought ministers ought to begin with themselves.

Mr. Lennox of Norton, N. B., saw much evidence of good work accomplished in his section. He spoke of the methods used and emphasized Paul's method of reasoning with the people out of the Scriptures. Luther and Knox followed the same plan.

Rev. Dr. Shearer, Secretary of the committee on Evangelism and moral and social reform of the Presbyterian Church in Canada, spoke on the Canadian Evangelistic Services, in Toronto. The campaign had not resulted in as many additions to the Church as had been anticipated, owing to want of preparation and congregational unity. Much good had resulted however, in the founding of "The Testament League." The promoter of the league who was converted at these meetings was a hunter and through the efforts of this one man, hundreds had been converted. Great blessings came to Ministers and people, as a result of those meetings. He had also a word to say about hindrance to the work. He emphasized the need among Ministers and Elders of showing the spirit of Christ in our walk and conversation, and life among our brethren. He referred to ministers' retreats.
