Grain Prices

WINNIPEG, Nov. 28 (CP)—A mixture of bullish and bearish factors failed to induce buying power in North American wheat pits Saturday in view of possible developments in southern hemisphere countries where harvesting is underway.

Most world markets registered minor losses. Wheat futures on the Winnipeg grain exchange closed 1-2 to 1-4 cent lower. November at \$1.11 1-8, Dec \$1.09 7-8, May \$1.09 5-8 and July \$1.06.

Cash wheat prices for No. 1 and 2 grade closed 1-2 cent higher at 17 1-2 and 10 1-2 cents above the November future. Volume of trade was small with some lots of No. 4 northern selling 1 1-2 cents higher. Durum trade was dull.

Speculative selling in rye sent those futures down 1 3-4 to 2 3-4 cents. Domestic interests supported oats and light buying in barley found closing quotations 3-4 to 3-8 higher. Flax closed 2 cents lower to unchanged.
