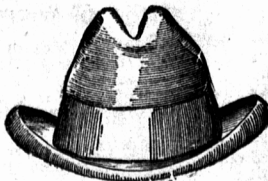

At the meeting of the school trustees which was held at Victoria, yesterday, the new trustee appointed was D. G. McQuarrie. A supplement of \$75 was voted and \$25 for the assistant. Running expenses \$80.

LeClair, Mrs. LeClair, Miss M. Campbell. She will leave this morning on return to Boston, taking a large lot of produce.

Rev. GEORGE STEELE, and Rev. Dr. Paisley of Sackville, Rev. W. W. Lodge, of Charlottetown, Rev. Thos. Allen, of Port Egin, Rev. P. A. Wightman, of Alberton, (P. E. I.); Rev. Mr. Bell, of Petricodiac; Rev. H. E. Thomas, of Moncton, and Rev. H. Harrison arrived in St. John on Monday afternoon on their way to Marysville to attend the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Methodist Conference.

A MOST praiseworthy entertainment was given at the Opera House last night by the pupils of the Congregation de Notre Dame. Especially deserving of praise was the musical part of the program. Last night's achievement evidenced the thoroughness of training imparted and was notable for the good taste displayed in the matter selected for reproduction. The audience was pleased.

Quite a large delegation of Charlottetown boys will attend the Maritime Boys' Camp, July 17 to 31st. Mr. Archibald, who has attended at least one boys' camp, each year for the last fourteen years, will accompany the Charlottetown boys. He will be glad to talk over camp matters with any boys who have not yet decided to go. A. W. Robb, as head leader is pushing matters, and a large and well managed camp is assured.

A MOTHER and daughter living on Dorchester Street, on return from the theatre last evening to their home, heard an infant crying in the house, which they had left locked and empty. They reported the matter at the Police Station. Later the infant out of the house to the police station and insisted on leaving it there, and on refusing to take it back he was locked up and the child given in charge of a woman.

THE S. S. Polino, of the Dobell line which arrived late on Monday evening was busy discharging and loading yesterday. Her inward cargo for this port consisted of 38 tons iron frame structure for the new railway station, Charlottetown, and sundry other packages. She sailed last night with 28 head of cattle, 10 sheep and about 800 bags of produce for the Sydney and St. John's markets. The S. S. Restigouche of the same line will leave Montreal for this port next Monday.

The annual meeting of the ratepayers of the Jonestown's River School District was held yesterday. There was a large attendance, more so than in any other former year. Augustine Walker was re-elected a trustee; the other trustees namely, John W. Ryan and John McDonald continuing in office. A resolution in the following form was unanimously carried: That a sufficient sum, not exceeding three hundred dollars shall be raised for completing the new School House, now in course of erection on the land purchased by the trustees from Francis McKenna on the corner of the Donagh and Jonestown's River Roads, and towards the payment of the price thereof, and that the action of the trustees in erecting the said building and purchasing the site be ratified, and confirmed, and that the trustees do, without any further delay, proceed and have the said new school building finished and ready for use with as little delay as possible, and that the trustees be and they are hereby authorized to borrow the said sum of money for the purchase and improvement of the said new grounds and building of the new school house, and that the building be insured against fire. A further sum of fifty dollars was voted for the new school building on the new site, and a sum of twenty-two dollars was voted for school expenses for the current year. A resolution was also unanimously carried authorizing the trustees to sell and dispose of the old school building, and the land on which it is situated.

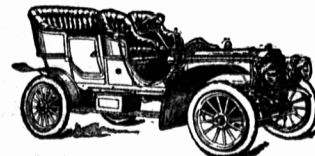
