"Today corsets have an entirely different purpose in a woman's life—the scientifically made corset is beneficial instead of injurious. And the War Industries Board arrived at this decision only after they had all the evidence in hand and thoroughly convinced. Secondly, corsets will be conscientiously made to fit and support the natural lines of the human form, rather than make the human form fit into some so-called stylish corset."
