Stock Markets At A Glance

WINNIPEG, Sept. 13 (CP) — Trade in the rye futures market continued irregular, with local and commission house liquidation. The close was 1 1/2 to 1 3/4 cents a bushel lower with October at 92 1/4.

MONTREAL, Sept. 13 (CP) — The slow drift toward lower levels of prices of pivotal securities which has been in progress for some time continued today on the Stock Ex-change and Curb Market. All in-dices were revised downward.

TORONTO, Sept. 13 (CP) — The Stock Market registered a con-siderable recovery in the closing period after selling down smartly in the early hours. The gains, espe-cially, showed improvement, reduc-ing a mid-day loss of 93 to 14 at the close. Base Metal and Western Oils Stock had minor gains at the close.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13 (AP) — A slow decline in the Stock Market today culminated in a fairly fast sell-off in the final hour chipping prices of leaders fractions to around 2 points.

The Associated Press Stock com-posite fell 15 of a point to 53.3. Volume rose to 880,420 shares a-gainst yesterday's 546,580.

CHICAGO, Sept. 13 (AP) — Feed grain futures were unsettled in trading markets today, but wheat held strong, supported by a broad short-covering movement and a lack of offerings which trade sources attributed to commodity credit corporation purchases and the government loan program.

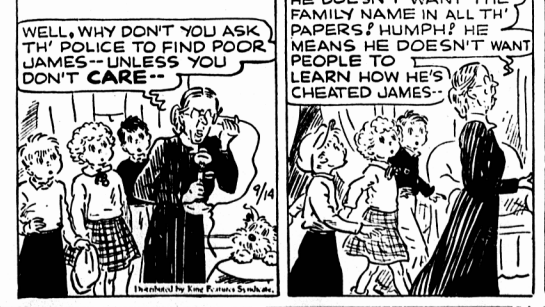

No other details of the proposed visit were available.

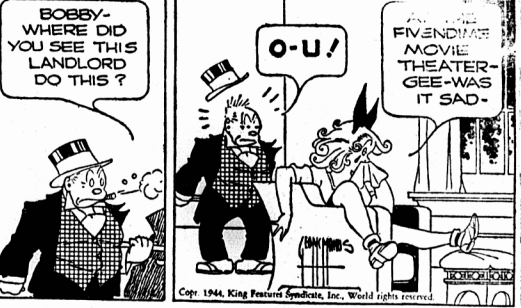
NIGERIAN MUSEUMS
