THE WAR IN SOUTH AFRICA.

Lord Kitchener is having a hard time in his efforts to bring the South African war to a close. The renewed energy and activity of the enemy over a very large area excites surprise and astonishment. We hear of vigorous Boer operations in the Transvaal in the vicinity of Pretoria and also on the line of the Delagoa railway; Dewet it still at large and as active as ever in the old Free State, now between Bethlehem and Lindley. In the meantime the invasion of Cape Colony is proving serious, not so much from the numbers of the invaders as from the strong sympathy of the Dutch population among whom they move. The invaders seem to be aided in every way, with horses, supplies and information, and although not many of the Colonial Dutch have actually joined the Boer forces, it is significant that this is attributed to the want of arms rather than of a disposition to join. How serious the trouble in Cape Colony is becomes apparent when we note the proclamation of martial law in four or five electoral divisions in the heart of the country, and the landing of heavy guns from the ships for the greater security of Cape Town itself. Evidently the end of the war is not yet very near.

Writs appear to have been issued for the by-elections at which Hon. Messrs Rogers, Peters and Cummiskey will ask for the endorsement of their acceptance of office. Should there be any opposition the polling will take place on 30th January. We notice that the Examiner while not advising opposition to the return of the provincial Ministers, asks that a statement of the public accounts down to the end of last year be made public. We think it desirable that this Province should adopt the federal plan of publishing monthly statements of receipts, expenditures and the public debt. For some reason not explained none of the Provinces appear to have yet taken this course. It would be the more difficult to suddenly adopt such a course here at the present moment from the fact that the Cabinet has just been reconstructed and all the departmental heads are new to their duties. This argues in no way against the adoption of a system of quarterly or monthly statements of account being published in the future.

The miners' strike at Pictou and Spring Hill apparently includes about 1,000 men, who demanded a 10 per cent. present increase of pay to be followed by a further advance of 10 per cent. in May. Strikes are regrettable alike in the interest of employers, employees and consumers. It is earnestly to be desired that a fair settlement of the difficulties may be reached and operations resumed at an early date.

An Ottawa despatch to THE GUARDIAN announces the transfer of the winter steamer Stanley from Summerside to the Georgetown Pictou route.

Mr. Howard Dutcher, son of the late Rev. Mr. Dutcher, well known as a teacher of this province, is now located in Somerville, Mass. He discontinued his course at McGill University to take a trip through England last year.

Mr. Joseph Doyle, of Glengarry, who was engaged as a foreman with Norcross Bros., Boston, for a number of years and who was crushed by a 12 ton girder was in the city yesterday returning from Boston. It will be remembered that in the terrible accident while constructing the new theatre in Boston on April 24th, one of his legs was cut off and the other terribly mangled, besides receiving injury to his hip. It is understood that he has entered an action against the company claiming \$50,000. He went to his home during the day.

She had 430 packages of freight inward, besides 60 bags mails and 13 passengers.

THE GUARDIAN has received a copy of the Vancouver Daily Province which contains the story of the loss of the steamer Alpha in the howling gale of Saturday Dec. 15th. says:—The story told by the survivors of the officials at Nanaimo as reported by The Province correspondent there is plain and to the point. The almost frenzied commands of the unfortunate captain as in desperation he ordered the helm put to port and starboard indicate how terrible must have been the situation in his eyes when the light was seen. He appears, however, to have done all that lay in his power for it was made very plain that the ship would not answer her helm at all. The conduct of officers and men throughout seems deserving of the praise, but it is to be noted that the loss of the lives of the nine men who stayed aboard was not due to any attempt on their part to save the ship for that was a manifest impossibility to everyone after she struck heavily and broke in two. What impelled them to remain aboard no man now can tell, for the sea has stopped their voices forever, but it seems probable that to them it appeared safer to stick to the ship than to attempted that terrible passage through the hungry waters by the life line. The story written by one of the survivors for The Province gives a thrilling idea of how awful that night must have been. The sensations of the crew on the wrecked vessel, waiting, as she pounded on the cruel jagged rocks, to see whether or no that brave man Anderson had reached shore or not, and afterwards the landing of Ernest Gough of P. E. I. can only be imagined. It falls to the lot of few to pass through so nerve-racking an experience. The survivors arrived in Vancouver Friday morning, most of them in an utterly destitute condition. A benefit in their behalf has been suggested, and it is very certain that an appeal to the sympathies of Vancouver people will not be made in vain.

Island when 12 years of age in the year 1829 with her parents from Caithness Scotland. She leaves four daughters and one son to mourn her loss.

At Amesbury, Mass., on the 13th of Dec. 1900, David Peter O'Donnell, son of Anthony O'Donnell, of Avondale, Lot 149, aged 41 years. He leaves a wife and three children besides his father, mother, two brothers, five sisters, and a large circle of friends to mourn their loss.
