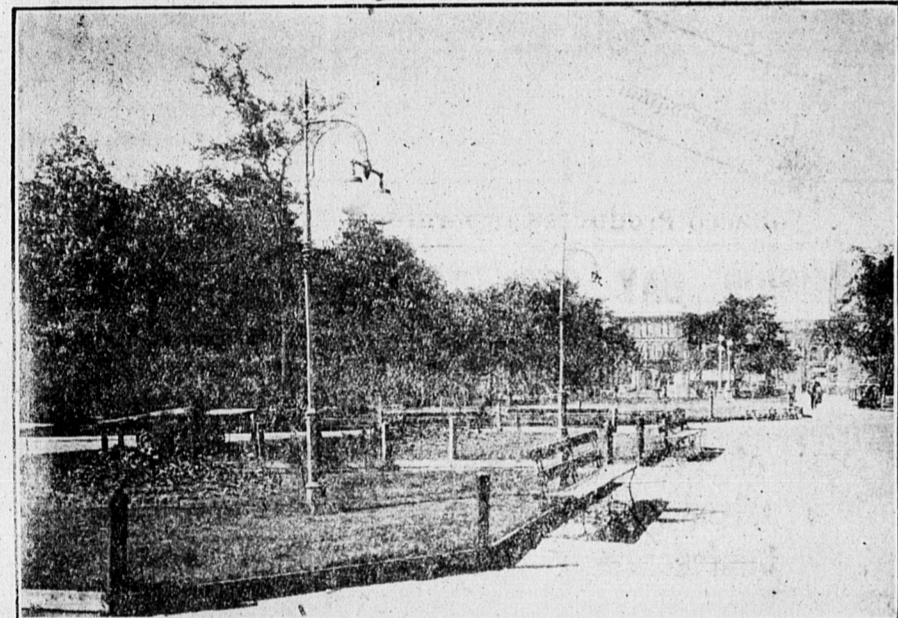

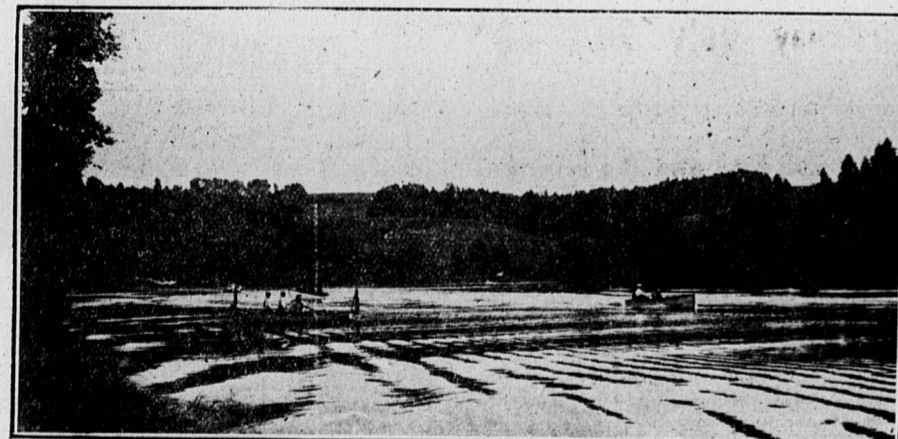

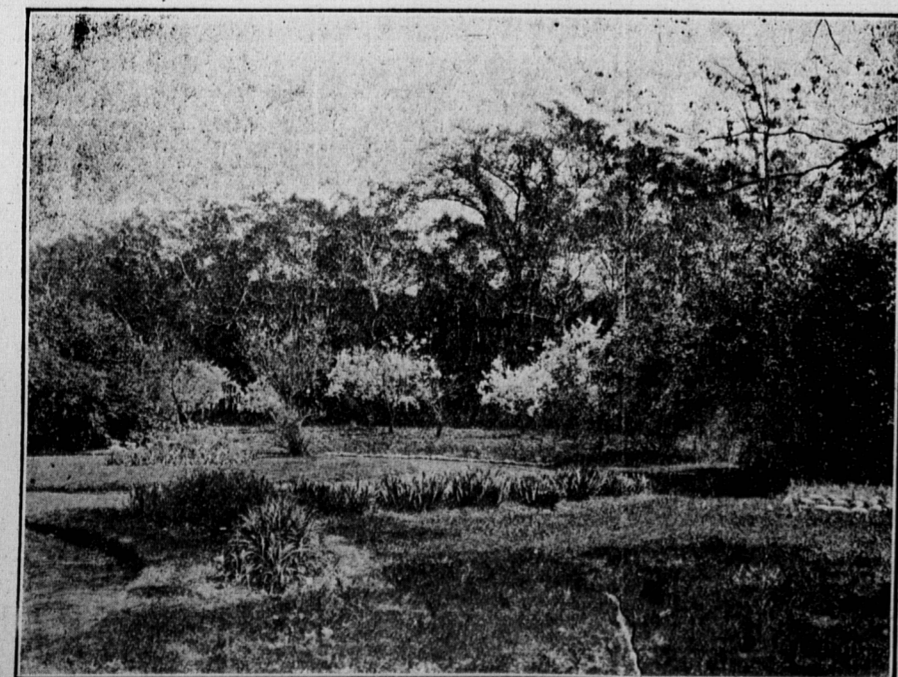

Squirrel As Aerial Glider

(By Mominion News Service) LONDON, June 20.—A flying squirrel from India, which has been presented to the Zoo, is the first of its species to be seen at the menagerie for 30 years.

Flit, as this rarity is called, is a shy little creature at present, and, being of nocturnal habits, he is averse to day-light demonstrations of how his kind have endeavoured to master the air.

Although they began their efforts to fly early in the Tertiary era, they have not been very successful, though it is more likely that the power to glide from tree to tree being sufficient for their purpose, they have had no incentive to make further progress in aviation.

They are certainly adepts at parachuting, because of an extraordinary expansion of the skin, which, joined to the limbs, opens out when the animal leaps, and forms a cavity capable of supporting it while swooping through the air.

By dint of much coaxing, Flit essayed such a glide in the confines of his cage, its objective being, apparently, the half-open door.

The keeping, however, frustrated this dodge to escape, and picking up the nimble little animal, wrapped him round his neck, when with his wide folds of skin and flattened tail, Flit looked more like a fur stole than a living creature.

Is The Church Too Respectable

LONDON, June 21.—"What is wrong with the church," said the Bishop of Chelmsford at Woodford, "is that it has ceased to be the Church militant—a fighting Church—and has got too respectable."

It was urged that the Church should become a fighting Church once more.

But the clergy could not carry on the fight alone.

There were Christians, declared the Bishop, who spent more money on drink and on tobacco than upon Christian missions.

Last year all that church and chapel together could scrape up for missionary work was \$15,000,000; yet in the same year \$166,000,000 were spent on drink and \$750,000,000 on tobacco.

Leeds Cripple Cured

(By Mominion News Service) LONDON, June 20.—A cripple for five years, and regarded as incurable lame, Miss Gertrude Hunt, of the Bricklayers Arms Holbeck, took part in a recent pilgrimage to Lourdes, and when she returned home recently, she was still a cripple and had to be assisted from the train. The following day, however, she suddenly found herself cured, and is now able to walk quite normally.

Her injury was caused by an accident at the factory where she was employed, and was aggravated by a fall two years ago when on holiday at Eastby, near Skipton.

The 23 hours' journey across France tried her greatly and she suffered intense pain, but she persisted with the "cure." Each day at Lourdes she was taken to the grotto and many times went into water.

DEATH STALKS NEAR ALTA AS FLEMISH COUPLE WED

GOETTINGEN, June 21.—The "shadow of the gallows" fell across the marriage altar at an unique wedding which occurred here recently. The bride was a daughter of a man sentenced to death, and both best man and bridesmaid were under similar sentences.

The groom had been condemned only to 20 years imprisonment. All four were fugitive Flemish who had been convicted by the Belgians because of certain Flemish tendencies and pro-Germanism.

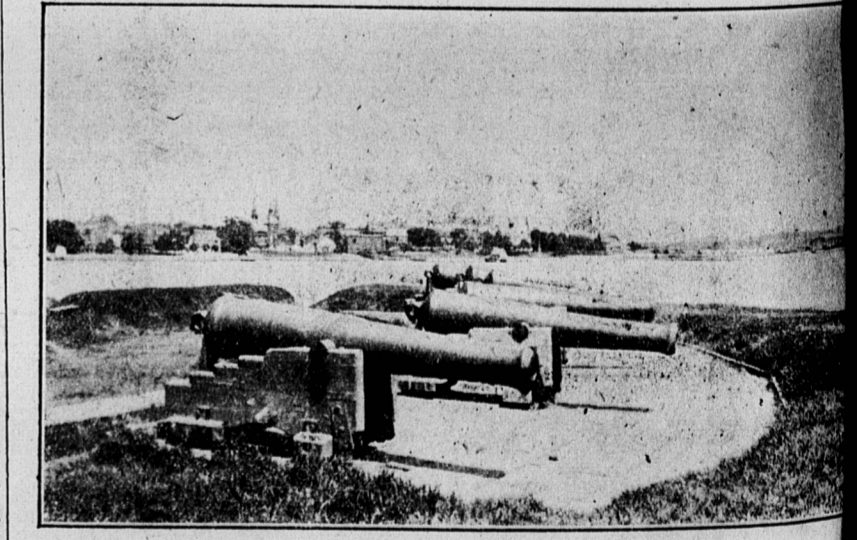

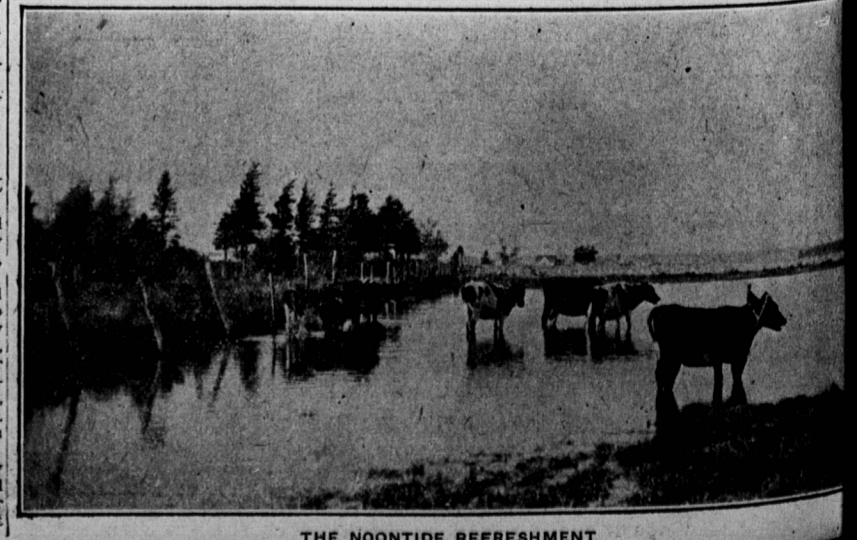
BELVIDERE GOLF LINKS, CHARLOTTETOWN
