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## DELEGATES FACE MOMENTOUS TASK

### Search Party Finds Body Of S'side Man Missing Since Sunday

Foul Play Suspected By Police In Circumstances Connected With Death Of Fred Gaudet, Summerside, Following Alleged Quarrel At Holman's Island — Inquest Adjourned Until Today.

The body of Fred Gaudet, a workman in the employ of Mr. Lawrence Gallant, tailor, Summerside, was found last evening near the Lighthouse, opposite Holman's Island, under circumstances which lead the authorities to suspect foul play. The body was found by Corporal Ingles, of the R. C. M. P., and a search party which had been looking for the missing man all day yesterday. Testifying before a coroner's jury last night, Corporal Ingles stated there were injuries which could scarcely be accounted for as due to accident. The ears had the appearance of having been badly bitten; there was a cut over the left eye and the lips were swollen. The body was found in a kneeling position about a quarter of a mile from the shore opposite the spring on Holman's Island.

Earlier in the day, rumors were afloat that Gaudet, accompanied by Landry, Thomas Brown and Benjamin Souler, had gone over to Holman's Island on Sunday afternoon in a dory borrowed from Mr. Andrew Paturel, that all but Gaudet had turned up later in Summerside and that Mr. Paturel had reported the disappearance of his boat to the police who then discovered that Gaudet was missing and that drinking and quarrelling was alleged to have taken place among the men on Holman's Island. It was reported that Gaudet had left his companions and had gone off by himself in the dory, leaving the others to walk the

### Trinidad Markets Open To British Empire Products

Increased Preferences Are Expected to be of Great Benefit to Canada.

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, June 12—Increased preferences in the tariff on goods entering Trinidad and Tobago from Canada and other parts of the British Empire have just been enacted. The changes are expected to benefit Canadian trade to a considerable extent.

A list of articles hitherto on the free list is now made dutiable when coming from countries outside the British Empire. It includes eggs, fresh fish, fruits other than apples, scientific apparatus, certain fresh vegetables, school equipment, arms, ammunition and uniforms, articles for use in churches, and articles for municipalities, district boards, libraries or public institutions.

A duty of 10 per cent has been placed on vegetables entering under the general tariff while Empire products continue to enter free. Apples had previously enjoyed a preference but now a tariff of 10 per cent has been placed on all foreign grown fruits.

The duties on milk, condensed or otherwise preserved, has been altered from 2½ per cent preferential and 12½ per cent general to six pence per 48 pounds preferential and two shillings general. This change should benefit Canadian exporters as Canada supplied \$24,925 of the \$143,741 worth imported last year.

EMPIRE DELEGATES FIXED VALUES

Canada Elected to Committee, Charting Course of Parley

LONDON, June 12.—(C.P. Cable)—Canada was today elected to the "steering committee" of the World Economic and Monetary Conference. This body, known as the Conference Bureau, has the task of charting the course which will best lead the delegates of 66 nations to effective action on the problems which confront the conference.

Before the conference opened today Prime Minister R. B. Bennett of Canada and the Canadian Finance Minister, Hon. E. N. Rhodes, and other Dominion's delegates gathered with the entire United Kingdom delegation under Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald at No. 10 Downing Street to discuss the course to be pursued. The meeting, as is customary with the Empire gatherings that precede international conferences, was private.

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### LABOR DISPUTE ARISES IN SACKVILLE

Stewart Construction Company Refuses to Pay Laborers 25 Cents An Hour.

SACKVILLE, N. B., June 12—This university town is experiencing a taste of labor trouble. The dispute, hinging on the question of wages, is between local laborers and the Stewart Construction Company of Sherbrooke, Que., contractors for new buildings to replace the Mount Allison University units destroyed by fire this year.

Some 40 pickets, demanding 25 cents an hour in place of the 15 cents offered, peacefully persuaded a dozen men to quit work today. A score of men from outside the town worked this afternoon without interruption, but the strikers declared they would picket the campus again tomorrow. Police protection for the workers was requested by the company.

About 50 unemployed men held meetings today and paraded the streets. A placard nailed to a telephone pole in the business section read: "Unemployed of Sackville, can you live on 15 cents an hour?" Below was the company's scale of wages: "Laborers 15 cents per hour,
