Wolverines Down Nicklin Hawks 2-1

Three Goals Scored In Less Than Three Minutes In Middle Frame.

HALIFAX, Feb. 13—Halifax Wolverines drew up to within one point of leadership in the Maritime Hockey League's second section here tonight as they stepped out and trimmed the Moncton Hawks, who already have the first position under their belts and are leading down the stretch at the head of the parade.

Goals by Todds Beazley and Frankie Graham midway in the second period gave the Wolves their victory and considerably heightened the local crew's chances of a play-off berth. Bill Miller unscathed the shot that beat Sargeant and gave Moncton its only tally.

Hawks Short Four Regulars
The Hawks, playing without four of their regulars, put up a rather poor exhibition against the locals, Mike McDonald, Dud James, Sammy McManus and Nucker Brine did not put in an appearance with the Hawks, being confined to their homes with influenza.

Burrage At Centre
Defenceman Len Burrage was pressed into service as a forward, and only three substitutes were used by the Hawks. Consequently, the visitors were unable to stand the hot pace maintained by the Wolves and were forced to stall.

Fast Scoring
The three goals were scored within three minutes in the second period. First Todds Beazley snapped up Ferguson's pass at 12:22 to beat the rubber past Foster. Walker was serving time in the penalty box when Beazley beat the Hawk goalie. Less than two minutes later Connolly skated to the Wolverine line and caromed a hot peg off Frankie Lavigne. Bill Miller came in fast to pick up the loose rubber and lifted it past Sargeant before the Wolverine goalie could make a move. It was exactly sixty seconds later that Frankie Graham rebounded from end to end, slid around Gill, drew Foster out and shot accurately for the corner.

Connolly A Standout
Bert Connolly, lanky Moncton defender, gave an outstanding exhibition most of the way. His attacking sorties generally carried him into good shooting position. His shots gave goalie Sargeant no trouble and his smart ragging when the team was short-handed through penalties drew applause from the fans.

Nice Goal By Graham
Graham and Lavigne put up a stout defensive game, while Graham's goal was one of the highlights of the night. Vince Ferguson, Ernie Mosher, Chummie Lawrence and Todds Beazley were good most of the way, while Lennon was good in spots. Shields worked hard as usual. Mickey McGlashen, returning to the game after a long injury, was not at his best.

Bill Miller chased Bert Connolly for honors among the Hawks. The former Mount Allison and Campbellton centre ice ace, was a threat to the Wolverine cage throughout. His goal was a smart piece of work, showing what fast following will do on loose pucks.

Jimmy Foster turned in a neat play in the Moncton cage. He had shots to handle. Many were from long range, but in the opening period he halted some that looked like sure goals.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Moncton Hawks, playing four regulars short, gave Wolverines a stiff argument at Halifax last night, the latter just managing to eke out a one goal margin on the night's play to win 2 to 1. The victory leaves the Halifax crew in virtually the same position they were in this time last week, one point behind Moncton for leadership in the second section of the Loop. The standing is at present: Moncton, 14; Wolves, 13 and Abbies, 9. Should Hawks win tomorrow night and Abbies follow suit on Friday, then the teams will be on the same footing as they were on the occasion of the Wolves' last appearance on local ice, with Abbies having a postponed game to play with Hawks at the end of the schedule. Abbies have five games yet to play; Moncton, four and Wolverines, three, and two of the latter's games are with Abbies. Therefore, although the Halifax team is enjoying a four point lead over Abbies at the present time, they are nevertheless in a ticklish position as their chance for a play-off berth in the "Big Three" is by no means assured.

Charles F. Adams' resignation as governor of the N.H.L. is stirring the hockey waters today. He does not resign as Boston president, which means that he still controls a considerable sphere of influence. The United Press report today intimates that he resigned because he resented Canadian domination of league politics. This means the domination of all Canadian clubs. It states that Major Frederic McLaughlin, of Chicago, resigned for the same reason some time ago.

Adams has been at loggerheads with President Calder over the Shore line. He has been battling with Leo Dandurand over the recent incidents in the Boston game. Leo alleges he was behind orders to rough the Canadian team. He wants an investigation of his charges, as well as censure for Adams. Adams has objected to the Calder decision in the Shore case as "unfair." He gave no reason for his resignation, but he may be going to join Major McLaughlin in holding aloof from league deliberations while he pulls the strings through his nominee. In Canada there has been a feeling that the Boston club exerted the greatest influence in the league, although the warring between Calder and Adams offset that impression considerably in the past two years. It is generally considered that in leaving the committee room that the Boston owner has some move in reserve which will show in due time.

Intermediate Play-offs
The fur will fly among the eastern intermediate loopsters this week. Second Abbies are scheduled to meet Saint Dunstan's in a sudden death playoff tomorrow night, which means the winners will clash with Montague Primroses, home and home games for the championship.

Bill Cook And Northcott Tied

Scoring Aces Of Rangers And Maroons Have Each 32 Points—Toronto And Detroit Well Out In Front Of Respective Sections.

MONTREAL, Feb. 13—(C.P.)—For the third successive week Bill Cook right winger of New York Rangers and Laurence Northcott, left wing of Montreal Maroons, were deadlocked tonight for leadership in points scoring in the National Hockey League.

The official lists, issued by President Frank Calder, showed however that it was a lean week for the two leading marksmen, each having picked up but a single point. Northcott now has 20 goals—highest in the League, and 12 assists while Cook has 16 of each.

Young Paul Haynes of Maroons continues to hold third place in the League, second in the Canadian division, with 13 goals, 17 assists, 30 points. He has opened a gap of four points over Johnny Gagnon, Canadiens, third with 26 and of six points over Harvey Jackson, Toronto, Jimmy Ward and Hooley Smith, Maroons, each with 24.

In the United States division Bun Cook continues at his brother's heels with 19 goals, 10 assists, 29 points. Paul Thompson, Chicago, and Frank Boucher, Rangers, are tied for the next position with 25 points each while Marty

TORONTO, Feb. 13—Radical suggestions that the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada invite amateur bodies which wish to allow mixing of amateurs and professionals to form a body of their own and govern their own sports was made today by P. J. Mulqueen, a pillar of Canadian amateurism.

Mulqueen, who has been chairman of the Canadian Olympic Committee for many years and always identified with the faction in Canadian amateur sport bitterly opposed to mingling of pros and amateurs, made the proposal in a communication to the Toronto Star.

"We have certain ideals and ideas of what can be and shall be done in amateur—they have others," he writes, "So why not have independent bodies to handle sport as each body desires it shall be handled?"

Mulqueen points out there is a growing desire for regulations permitting professionals in one branch of sport to compete as amateurs in another and for professionals and amateurs to mix in various ways.

WILL MEAN END OF A.A.U.—WILSON
CALGARY, Feb. 13—If organizations are formed to permit the mingling of professional and amateur athletes it will mean the end of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada, according to Ralph Wilson, president of the Alberta branch of the A. A. U.

Mr. Wilson approved the suggestion made in Toronto yesterday by P. J. Mulqueen, prominent amateur head, that amateur branches wishing to mingle pros and amateurs be allowed to form organizations of their own for this purpose.

"If the various branches were to form their own organizations for this purpose," Mr. Wilson added, "it would mean the breaking-up of the mother body, the A.A.U."

HAMILTON DISAPPROVES
LETHBRIDGE, Alberta, Feb. 13—Disapproval of any suggestion that independent association should be set up to permit mixing of professionals and amateurs was expressed here yesterday by J. M. Hamilton, president of the Saskatchewan Amateur Athletic Union.

"United we stand, divided we fall," Mr. Hamilton said when shown a suggestion put forward by P. J. Mulqueen, prominent eastern sportsman that separate bodies of amateurs and professionals mix. "These separate bodies would never be able to co-operate," Mr. Hamilton said.
