**THOROUGHbred WON RACE**

JACKSONVILLE, Fla., Dec. 26.—A contest unique in sporting events was decided at Moncrief Park today by a special handicap novelty race, in which was tested the speed of an able runner, a thoroughbred horse, a mule and an automobile. The winner was returned in Marie Hyde, the race horse, favorite in the betting at 3 to 5, who under the handicap conditions was required to cover six furlongs. Her time was one minute sixteen and one-fifth seconds. Eight lengths ahead came the mule, which started four and a half furlongs from the wire, while the runner who had 550 yards to negotiate, finished third. The automobile which was asked to travel one and one-eighth miles, after a running start of a sixteenth of a mile, was a distant trailer, probably due to a slow track.

**CLOSING COTTON LETTER.**

(From F. B. McCurdy & Co's Private Wire.)

NEW YORK, Dec. 28.—The weakness of yesterday was in evidence again during today's early trading and prices eased off to a net decline of about 12 to 21 with May contracts selling through 15 cents for the first time since the Publication of the Governments estimate on Dec. 9th. Around 14.95 for that month there will be better support and the market later rallied to within a point of the previous close. The market was unsettled but in readiness in which the market has declined a little more than half a cent from the recent high record, appears to have abated its confidence in some extent. Probably these declines are reflected a combination of influences rather than any particular development or any real change in the general situation. This morning the cables fully met the American decline of yesterday which was under the impression of disappointing remaining longs, there was continued talk of larger ginnings in parts of the belt than expected, the estimate foreshadowed a continued free movement to the ports and there seemed to be no bull support of consequence in sight. While Liverpool futures were quite as low as our spots there were relatively steady no large sales and while the movement as to the ports continues heavy, it evidently reflects a big demand for export while the ginning may run a little larger than last summer and the governments estimate of the crop. It may be disappointing that the South has sold so freely being 14 and 15 cents but it is at least encouraging that the cotton has been taken so readily and it seems to us that the total supply for the Government estimate to fall short of the seasons requirements.

When the Goodwins had made up upon the return of the bride in August, they went on the road in a play called the Captain. For a time Mrs. Goodwin was the leading lady. The Captain failed to captivate the public.

**MRS CLARENCE GLOVER MAKES NEW MOVE**

BOSTON, Dec. 26.—After an absence of several days, Mrs. Lillian M. Glover, widow of the murdered Clarence F. Glover, returned yesterday to her home in Waltham. Following the acquittal of Hattie Le Blanc she remained in seclusion, resting after the proceedings which arose out of the death of her son. To a large number of legal proceedings which arose out of the death of Glover another may be added. Mrs. Glover is said to be anxious to secure control of the laundry, which is now under the control of the executor of Glover's will, Samuel D. Elmore.

If she takes steps to recover control of the laundry on the strength of the bill of sale which she stated she possesses, the incorporation of the laundry, giving her husband 138 shares, may not stand. A favorable ruling by the court would place the laundry into the hands of Mrs. Glover and relieve Attorney Elmore of practically all the property now included in the trusteeship.

Elmore is trustee of the Glover estate, out of which, under Glover's will, his widow receives the income of three-fourths, Seymour Glover is the only brother who is not out of in the will. He will receive the es-
