SCIENTIFIC THIEF HELD BY POLICE

NEW YORK, May 25.—A smartly dressed young woman and a well-turned-out young man were walking leisurely in Central Park West, near Eighty-fourth Street, early this afternoon, when two men who had been loitering behind quickened their pace and came up beside them. The leader of the two men, Detective Daly of police headquarters, put his hand

on the man's shoulders and told him he was under arrest.

"This is ridiculous," said the young woman.

"We have been trailing this man for a year," said Detective Mudge, the second of the two followers.

"I don't know if you know it, young lady, but this is William Tretry, who robbed Gumbiner's jewelry store, the Williamsburg

Bank at White Plains, the Corona Bank at Corona and the Roselle Bank in Roselle, N. J. He has quite a record. He is also known as Canadian Bill and Joe Wood."

"Recovering from the shock, the prisoner made a denial, but he was locked up in police headquarters, and his apartment, a well furnished place, at 33 West Thirty-fourth St. was searched.

Tretry, the detectives said, not only a practical robber and burglar, but is "statistician and financial adviser to a gang of thieves."

According to the police the prisoner is a unique specimen in the field of police work and probably formed himself on classic field models.

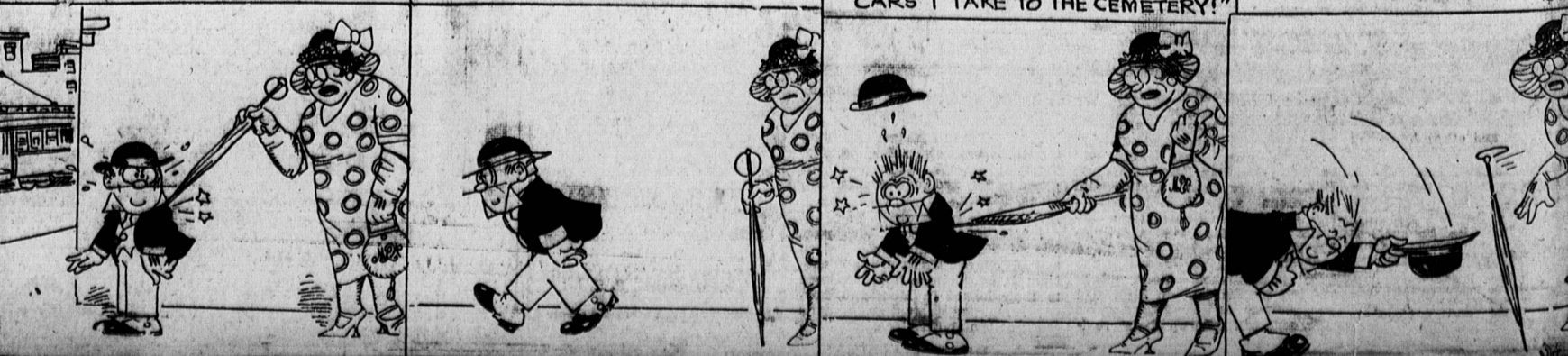
DICKY DIPPY'S DIARY.
