ZENITH TAKES OTHERS INTO CAMP SATURDAY AFTERNOON

"Mac" Irwin's Fast Little Craft Romps Home in First of Cup Series—P. No. Loses Rudder and is Forced to Withdraw—Ghost Second, and Shadow Third.

"Mac" Irwin's Zenith, one of the fastest eighteen footers of the Y. C. fleet showed the way home Saturday afternoon seven minutes in front of her nearest rival, the Ghost, owned by Ivan Reddin and sailed by George Buntain. The Shadow, young McLeod's handy little craft finished a good third, being half a minute behind Ghost.

The Sheik made her first appearance this year and sailed a great race in fourth position. This yacht, winner of many a hard fought contest last season and captained by her owner Ed Flynn footed in the last leg of the course and showed her real sailing ability, she gained on every boat during the last mile of the race.

The Zenith negotiated the course in one hour 34 minutes, fast time considering the long beats on the buoys.

Saturday's race was the first of a series of cup races to be held this season, points to count, and was voted one of the best seen here in a long while. A stiff north east wind rising just before the start and prevailing throughout gave the little craft all they could take and at times more than enough—visible centre-boards were the order of the day as the respective skippers drove each and every entry for all they were worth.

The Race by Buoy

The following yachts started:—Sheba, McInnis; Pollywog, Mills; Zenith, Irwin; Ghost, Buntain; Sheik, Flynn; P. No. King; Shadow, McLeod; Rob Roy, Cameron.

It was one of the best get-aways ever witnessed on the harbor. At the two and a half minute flag all boats were well bunched and coming down the line like race horses with the Rob Roy leading in the rear. When the final gun sounded each and every yacht was bolting over the line with all the stiff "north easter". It was a beautiful sight, these small yachts all bearing to a wash-board breeze and hearing away like something possessed of more than sails. The Zenith had the jockeying position well to windward and was being closely chased by P. No. when unluckily her rudder gave way forcing Captain King to give up the chase. The Zenith well out in front and sailing like a Trojan rounded the Park Buoy at 2.43, followed by the Sheik, Sheba, Rob Roy, Ghost, Shadow and Pollywog, all were bunched.

On the run to Rosebank Buoy the Zenith gained somewhat on the trailers passing this mark about a minute ahead of the Rob Roy in second place, with the bunch on rounding this buoy shook themselves and did a streak of sailing pleasant to watch. It was a long hard beat to the Bridge Buoy via the Staking Buoy and crossing the Ghost's bow on the tack in. The Ghost never sailed better at this stage, walking from fifth position to second in less than ten minutes and at the same time gaining a little on the leader. After a thrilling race on the first round, Zenith registered Ghost next at 3.18 1-2, Sheik, 3.20 1-2; Shadow, 3.22; Sheba, 3.22 1-2; Pollywog, 3.24; Sheba, 3.24.

On the run to the Park Buoy on the last round Zenith gained half a minute on the Ghost, coming round at 3.29; the Ghost at 3.31. If the Ghost lost on Zenith she gained on Sheik who rounded three minutes later, with the others holding their own; the Pollywog doing more than that by beating Rob Roy out of last position. The position of the boats were: Zenith, 3.29; Ghost, 3.31; Sheik, 3.34; Shadow, 3.35; Sheba, 3.39.

The positions on the Rosebank Buoy were much the same. The Zenith's time was 3.34 1-2; Ghost 3.37; Sheik, 3.40; Shadow, 3.43; Sheba, 3.45; Rob Roy, 3.46; Pollywog, 3.49.

On the beat to the Bridge a great race developed between Ghost, Shadow and Sheik for second, the Shadow nosing Sheik out and was right on Ghost's quarter at the Buoy, the Ghost finally beating her to the line. The time at the Bridge Buoy was: Zenith, 4.05; a big gain on the Ghost which rounded at 4.11; Shadow, 4.11 1-4; Sheik, 4.12; Sheba, 4.15; Pollywog, 4.16; Rob Roy, 4.17 1-2. The time home was: Zenith, 4.12; Ghost, 4.19; Shadow, 4.19 1-2; Sheik, 4.20; Sheba, 4.23; Pollywog, 4.25; Rob Roy, 4.26.
