Canadian Industrial Alcohol

The Canadian Industrial Alcohol annual meeting has now been definitely set for April 15th. It will be remembered that the meeting was recently postponed to February 26th but Justice Surveyer of the Montreal Court has set a definite date, as given above. The hearing on the petition of Lady Davis and Mortimer Davis, Jr., to have Lord Shaugnessy and A. M. Reaper removed as executors of the Sir Mortimer Davis estate will be held March 3rd.

Massey Harris

Massey Harris has been in demand of late, but it has been noted that once the orders are filled, interest peters out in the security. It is generally expected that the forthcoming annual report will show somewhat of an improvement in earnings, but this favourable factor is being counterbalanced to a considerable degree by the fact that many feel that the Canadian Wheat Pool may get into difficulties, which would be a hard blow to a large majority of the Western farmers, and hurt their purchasing power. Another unfavorable factor in the situation is that the holding up of wheat is retarding collections by Massey Harris as many farmers are depending on the cash coming to them through the Wheat Pool to pay for their implement purchases. The tie up in wheat in the West is having an adverse effect in more ways than one.

Winnipeg Electric

Winnipeg Electric is being recommended by certain brokerage houses as a purchase and in this connection it is pointed out that earnings for the year 1929 will reveal about \$4 a share on the common. Besides it is the only stock of the public utility group that has not been split up. When such facts are taken into consideration many believe that the stock is selling out of line. Power Corporation has a large interest in Winnipeg Electric.

International Nickel

The president of the International Nickel Company of Canada, Limited Mr. R. C. Stanley, was in Montreal on Saturday and when interviewed with regards to the affairs of his company Mr. Stanley stated that the annual report is now being prepared and that accompanying it is a detailed statement in connection with the operations of the property. Needless to say this will be perused by the 550,000 odd shareholders with the keenest of interest.

Mr. Stanley expressed himself as being satisfied with the development work on the Frood and in commenting on the outlook of business his opinion was that the International Nickel Company would have a good year notwithstanding the fact that all signs point to the belief that business for 1930 will not be on as high a level as it was in 1929. Although Mr. Stanley could not discuss the possibility of an increase in the present dividend rate it is generally agreed in well informed quarters that there is a fair chance of shareholders receiving a higher rate sooner than most people expect it.

BRANTFORD FIGHTS

DIPHTHERIA
BRANTFORD, Ont., Feb. 3—Brantford was one of the first, if not the first city in Ontario to initiate the use of toxoid for the prevention of diphtheria and as a result has had remarkable success in combating this disease, especially through the schools, states the Brantford Exposition in a recent article. Over 8,000 children have been immunized and not one of them has died of the disease. On the other hand, there have been several deaths among non-immunized children.
