The camp as a whole was in charge of Mr. R. C. Sidenius. The boys who were present speak in the highest terms of the good work done in the camp and of its effect on their lives.

LOST A LEG.—Among soldiers who arrived home this week bearing evidences of war's havoc, was Robert Rogers, who was formerly employed on the dining room staff of the Victoria Hotel. Mr. Rogers belongs to Fredericton, in this province, and resided for seven years in Hope River. He enlisted in Boston, and sailed for overseas from St. John. He joined the 44th Battalion and in the battle of Cambrai on September 28th, 1918, was wounded in the shoulder, arm and leg by shrapnel. He was so badly wounded in the right leg that it had to be amputated the next day close to the thigh. He suffered a great deal both from the wounds in the leg and shoulder and was for many months in hospital, but happily is now again in first class health. He returned to Canada in April last and has been under treatment in hospital in Toronto since. He has to report back to Toronto on August 15th.
