Wings Fail To Halt March of Chicago

Blackhawks Take Second Straight From Detroit 4-1
Losers Hold Windy City Team In Check For Two Periods But Wilt Before Final Period Assault.

OLYMPIA, Detroit, April 5.—Chicago Black Hawks took a commanding lead in the Stanley Cup series tonight with a steaming third-period assault that netted three goals and gave Tommy Gorman's title-bound machine a 4-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings, National Hockey League champions. It was the second straight win on Detroit ice for the Hawks.

A disappointed crowd of more than 14,000 jubilant when the Hawks staged a gallant second-period rally to tie the score, watched the Hawks storm young Wilf Cude in the Detroit nets in the third period and lace three shots past him. The Wings were beaten soundly by the belated rush.

With two wins to their credit, the Hawks return home for the third and fourth games, heavy favorites to finish the series with a victory Sunday night. If a fourth game is necessary it will be played next Tuesday and if the Wings capture both games in Chicago the deciding fixture will be played here.

Only the memory of the upsetting Red Wings performances in the N. H. L. finals against Toronto Maple Leafs left Detroit fans with hopes that something might yet be done. In the Leafs-Wings series, Detroit scored two straight victories on Toronto ice, then returned home and lost two before winning the deciding game.

Art Coulter, husky sophomore defenseman of the Hawks, emerged as hero of the second game with a brilliant goal and a bang-up performance on the rearguard beside Lionel Conacher.

The Hawks had to fight 21 minutes and 10 seconds overtime to win the first game Tuesday night. There was a little less Red Wings resistance tonight. Jack Adams' starry brigade battled from behind all the way, striving to overcome a team that started faster and appeared to have more stamina.

Particularly in the first session, the Wings held a margin. Cooney Welland, Herbie Lewis and Larry Aurie staged a sustained offensive in hopes of landing the all-important first goal. They kept Goalie Chuck Gardiner on the hop without once beating him.

Welland and Donny MacPadden of the Hawks were both in the penalty box when Lola Couture burst through the Wings defense with the puck. He fell as he was about to shoot but managed to lift the rubber over Cude and into the net. Detroit evened the count mid-way in the second period.

The game Welland, playing with a fractured nose, an injury received in the first game, supplied Lewis with a scoring chance. The centre star banged a short-range shot against Gardiner's pads and Lewis pushed the rebound into the cage. The crowd cheered madly for the lightweight forward line.

But even the all-round power of this string could not cope with Chicago's late rush. Doc Romnes made the score 2-1 for the Hawks after less than two minutes of play in the third stanza on Paul Thompson's pass. This pair engineered Tuesday night's winning goal in overtime with Thompson on the scoring end.

Then Coulter lashed in his goal on a pass from Johnny Gottselig. While the Wings stormed the Chicago end of the rink in a vain bid to get back some of the lost ground, Gottselig flashed down alone to beat Cude the fourth time. Cude outgassed him the first time Johnny broke away, but the Hawk winger went right back and pulled the Detroit netman out of his cage to make sure.

Cude, 23-year-old rookie whose goalkeeping was the outstanding feature of the Toronto-Detroit series, turned in a great game in the wing nets. He kicked out 27 shots while Gardiner was handling 20.

ST. MICHAELS WIN JUNIOR CHAMPIONSHIP

Edmonton Club Force Irish Into Overtime Battle
Last Desperate Drive By Famed Toronto Team Keeps Memorial Cup East — Score 6-4

WINNIPEG, April 5.—In a hectic overtime battle, Toronto St. Michael's tonight eked out a 6-4 victory over Edmonton Athletic Club to capture the Canadian junior hockey championship and the Memorial Cup.

St. Mike's defeated the Albertans after two overtime periods to add to their first game victory of 5-0 and win the series in two straight games. The win split possession of the Memorial trophy in 16 years of competition evenly at eight victories each for east and west.

The eastern Irish collegians with the hooked athletes put on their power plays at effective moments while the Albertans matched them stride for stride. Territorial players had more precision and system to offset the skill of the westerners. Little Andy Maloney forced the game into overtime as he slipped only 20 seconds of the regular time to play. Harvey Teco in the St. Mike's cage, didn't have a chance to save.

Tigers Capture Maritime Hoop Championship

Fast Offensive By Dalhousie Team Overpowers New Brunswick Titleholders In Final Game For Maritime Basketball Title.

HALIFAX, April 5.—(By The Canadian Press)—Dalhousie Tigers, Nova Scotia champions, won the Maritime senior basketball championship by defeating Woodstock Senators, champions of New Brunswick, 49-29 here tonight. They won the round by 85-65, the first game last night, being a 39-26 tie.

Tigers, winners of the Maritime championship for the first time in more than 10 years, will now meet the winner of the Quebec-Ontario playdowns for the Eastern Canadian championship.

Dalhousie, playing fast-breaking, offensive basketball, scored seven points in the first five minutes, while Woodstock did not get a point. Reardon cut the lead down from the wings, but Reardon came back with two nice shots from inside the foul line to widen the breach. At the 10-minute mark Dalhousie was leading by 17 points.

Reardon and Brown each got a field goal before the period ended to make the score 21-10. Reardon, with five field goals, led both teams in this period, but was closely followed by Reardon and Brown, with two field goals each.

For the first few minutes of the second half the teams scored by turns, with Dalhousie always leading by 10 to 12 points. Dalhousie took time out after six minutes had elapsed and upon resumption of play, Bauld and Reardon scored to increase the lead to 15 points.

Reardon, playing spectacular basketball in this period, carried the brunt of the Senators' attack and scored five field goals. Woodstock, who just could not seem to get used to the baskets, missed many easy shots. They missed seven out of 14 penalties, while Tigers are nine points on seven personal fouls. Some of the fouls calling for two shots was the explanation. Reardon, former Saint John and Acadia player, led all in the scoring tallying 24 points out of his team's total of 49.

Reardon scored a larger percentage of his team's points with 18 out of 29 points.

The game tonight was faster than last night's with both teams playing on the attack at all times. Dalhousie, after having a commanding lead, kept up their attack and continually increased their advantage.

Dates of the Eastern Canadian playoffs have not been definitely decided, but April 15 and 16 have been suggested.

FOX ISSUES CHALLENGE TO BABE RUTH

Lou Gehrig Presents Real Threat For Long Distance Hitting Honors.

NEW YORK, April 5.—Jimmie Foxx's challenge to Babe Ruth for a side bet in the 1934 home run derby may be quite all right for purposes of baseball ballyhoo but the man the Maryland mauler will have to beat for the long-distance hitting honors is Lou Gehrig, the silent partner of the Yankee clubbing company.

It's a trifle too late now for the 26-year-old first baseman of the Athletics to toe defiance at the 40-year-old Bambino. Their paths have crossed and separated, with Foxx on the way up and Ruth on the way out. The Babe, despite any and all enthusiasm aroused by his spring antics, will be lucky to play 100 complete games.

Even with this handicap, however, it is the threat on how the youthful clubbers regard the "old man" of the Yankees when Foxx, for two straight years the undisputed home run king of the majors, adopts a brilliant attitude. In his prime Ruth seldom gave any of his rivals for home run honors a thought. He simply snorted and blew 'em down.

Foxx has had a substantial edge on Gehrig in home run hitting for the past two years. Jimmie collected 58, his high mark, in 1932 to Lou's 34 and led both leagues again last year with 48 to Gehrig's 32. Over the stretch of the last five years, however, they are fairly close together. Foxx with 206 and Gehrig with 188.

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JAP TENNIS ACE SUICIDES

Message received here today reported that Jiro Sato, great Japanese tennis player, had committed suicide by throwing himself from the line Hakone Maru soon after sailing from Singapore.

Suffering from a nervous complaint for some time, Sato was ill when the vessel, carrying him and other members of Japan's Davis Cup team, to Europe, arrived in Singapore.

The liner was halted for several hours while a futile effort to recover the body was made, according to information contained in telegrams sent by the steamship company and by the Japan Lawn Tennis Association.

Sato disembarked, intending to return to Japan, but decided to re-embark after he had been urged to do so in telegraph messages from Japanese tennis authorities.

On Thursday afternoon as the liner was passing the Malacca Straits, Sato was found to be missing. A search immediately was instituted and a letter was found in his cabin indicating his intention of taking his own life.

Mr. Leslie Simmons then presented the trophy to the winning team and congratulated both teams on showing such good sportsmanship throughout the contest.
