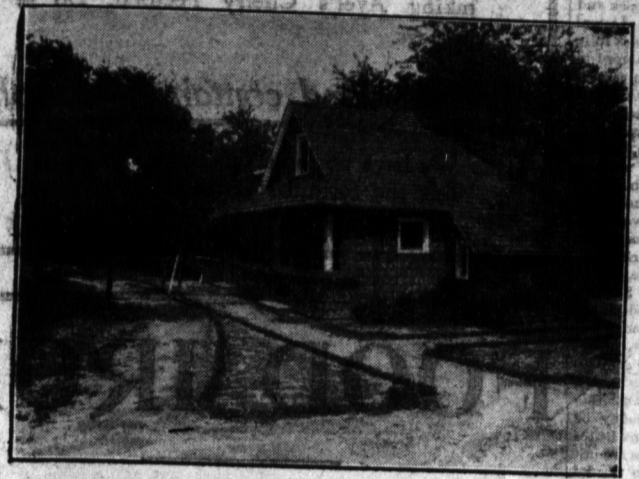

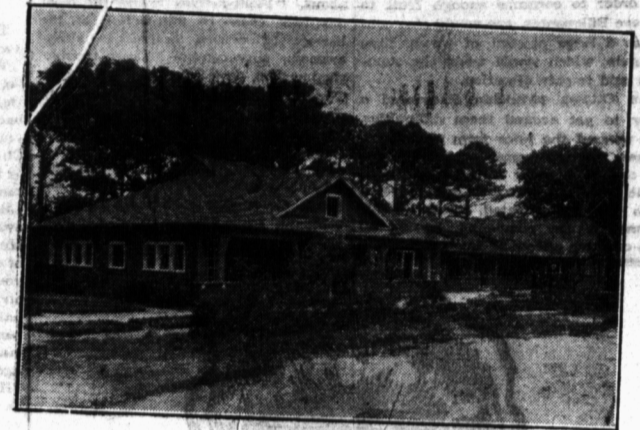

Notes From New York Correspondent

Four city blocks have been taken down and an excavation to the depth of forty feet been made. This great work will take four years to complete.

Tunnel construction is not as difficult as in former years. With the use of compressed air, it is now possible to bore through sand and silt, taking advantage of the quality of matter known as impregnability, the tunnel engineer is enabled to fill an air lock with compressed air, and this progress is through boring through a solid substance, a direct application of the old school-room experiment of turning an empty glass mouth down on a basin of water, and asking the wondering pupils: Why does not the water rise in the glass?

The McAdoo Tunnel from Jersey to Manhattan, the Belmont from Manhattan to Long Island and the New York City tunnel will when completed revolutionize New York passenger traffic.

Many huge palatial office buildings are being built, buildings to the extent of forty millions of dollars are being built within a radius of half a mile in lower Manhattan.
