FINLAND ONLY REHEARSAL FOR EUROPEAN DRAMA

STOCKHOLM, Feb. 11.—All diplomatic couriers on their way to Petrograd have been detained in Stockholm because of instructions received by the Finnish Minister here to give no passports for foreigners.

Scandinavian refugees brought to Stockholm by the first Swedish relief expedition tell harrowing stories of wholesale murder by the Red Guards in Velsingfors and Hammerfors. The situation has got entirely out of the hands of the Socialist leaders of the type of Sena. Manner and former Premier Tokoi, the accounts indicate. Persons familiar with Finland contend the revolt could be quickly suppressed if it were not for the Russian soldiers and sailors who are fighting on the side of the Reds on orders from the Smoly Institute in Petrograd.

That Lenin, Trotzky and their assistants in Russia regard the Finnish struggle as a first step in spreading the Bolshevik revolution westward is indicated by an interview with Lenin published in the local Bolshevik paper, the Politiken. In this Lenin declared: "We shall soon dispose of the small states." Upon the interview the Politiken comments thus: "What is going on in Finland now is only a rehearsal for the European drama, in which the curtain shortly is going up."

LIEUT. GOVERNOR OF QUEBEC IS CRITICALLY ILL

QUEBEC, Feb. 11.—Sir Evariste Le Blanc, Lieutenant-Governor of the Province of Quebec who has undergone a serious operation at University Philadelphia, Pa., is reported as being in a grave condition.

Lady LeBlanc received a letter from him dated the 6th instant in which he said that he felt quite well, but on Saturday shortly after the letter arrived, she received a telegram summoning her to his bedside. She left immediately accompanied by Major Pelletier, A. D. C.

IMPUGNS BOMBAST OF KAISER'S 'DECREE'

AMSTERDAM, Feb. 11.—Following is the full text of the German Emperor's birthday decree addressed to the Imperial Chancellor, as published in the German papers:

"The more serious the times and the greater the responsibility laid upon me by God, the more warmly and the more gratefully do I feel for these most faithful and loyal subjects, who in the most intimate relationship between the Crown and the people secured by my forefathers in long years of history has in the most happy times been drawn upon me most closely. I gleam upon me when I express the Fatherland's thanks to our heroic warriors at the front. It touches me deeply when I stand at the bedside of our wounded and dying. It meets me in a moving manner in all parts of the home and even here, it gleams in my utterance in open expression of earnest anxiety concerning the future of the Fatherland.

"Through twenty-six years it has been my heart's desire to consolidate peace in the Empire, and to promote economic life, science and technology, and therewith, the rise of the entire German people to an ever greater participation in the intellectual and economic possessions of the Fatherland.

"When the envy of our enemies forced me to go to the defense of our people for the defense of our home soil, with deep thankfulness I recall those proudest days of Germany's history, when all classes and parties proved that our beloved Fatherland was worth to them every sacrifice. Since then, I have been drawn into the leadership of our great military leaders and the inspired deeds of our army and the aid of our Allies standing faithfully at our side, successes which will be historic in the world have been ours.

"With steadfast perseverance, enormous labor and great achievements of the homeland we have also braved distress and hardship, so that our people, proved in field and country, can, with God's help look forward with strong assurance to a good peace.

"To this end, however, it now needs most serious self discipline, internal unity and willing subordination to great aims, readiness to bear even the heaviest burdens and confidence in our own invincibility, and the putting of our own powers for the one great aim—the winning of a strong secure future for the Fatherland.

"To this end I beg the loyal cooperation of all who love our people and will serve its future. They will arise from the blood of the fallen sons of Germany a strong Empire and a happy nation, blessed with economic, intellectual and moral possessions. So help us God."

JOY BELLS RINGING IN BERLIN OVER UKRAINE PEACE

LONDON, Feb. 12.—Joy bells were rung in Berlin and there were rejoicings at Vienna over the conclusion of a separate peace with the Kiev Rada.

Leon Trotzky, the Bolshevik foreign Minister, was still disputing the right of the Rada to represent Ukraine at the Brest-Litovsk negotiations, and while Ukraine is still torn by civil war.

Nothing is yet disclosed concerning the terms of peace thus secretly arranged, but they are supposed to include the cession of the Ruthenian portion of Galicia to Ukraine in return for some sort of Austrian protectorate, and it is pretty safe to assume that trade and economic relations will center largely into the new peace arrangement.

It is also rumored that the Central Powers have made an offer of military assistance to the Kiev Rada in overcoming the Bolshevik invasion. How far that invasion has been successful, or whether the Kiev Rada, representing the moderate Socialists, will be able firmly to establish its authority against the Kharkov Rada, representing the Bolsheviks, is unknown.

There is little news of the progress in fighting in Ukraine, and so far the reports of capture of the town of Mohilev and of Ensign Krylenko, the Bolshevik Commander-in-Chief, rests entirely on German reports. No confirmation is forthcoming from any Russian or independent source.

One of the first results of the new peace policy is being devoted to using peace with Ukraine as a lever to bring pressure on Trotzky.

The signing of peace has been received with greater enthusiasm at Vienna than at Berlin. This is due to the fact that it removes the menace to Austria's frontier and hastens the expectations of relief of the food situation from Ukraine grain reserves.

MARBLE OF ITALY

Italy is one of the world's most famous sources of supply for both art and building marbles. Marble, granite, and building stones are the common materials used for buildings. Venice is a freeport city, built of stone of Istria and marble and the foundations and first courses at least of all palaces, public and municipal buildings, government and business edifices are of these materials. They are used more than brick and wood. The use of the latter being confined almost entirely to inferior finishing. Venice is immediately adjacent to the most important quarries in the Venetian area and near Verona, the Venetian red and yellow marbles having been favorite building stones since the time when the Colosseum at Verona was constructed. The building they rank next to the stone of Istria in popularity and are true marbles, while the stone of Istria is not a true marble, although a very hard limestone that is much used in Venice, because it resists the action of salt water and sea winds.

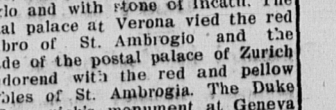
Paving stone in Venice is neither marble nor granite, and is procured almost exclusively from the Monsele, in this district in slabs approximately one to two feet square and two inches thick.

Salvation Army Tag Day and Street Collection :: Feb. 23rd. COMMISSIONER RICHARDS appeals for \$20,000

Which is Urgently Needed for the Upkeep and Extension of the Army's War-Time Work Amongst the Canadian Troops

Throughout Canada a Tag Day and Street Collection is to be held in every city and town where the Army is established. The date of this effort has been fixed for FEBRUARY 23rd. The object is to raise money for our War Work, the needs of which must appeal to every Canadian. Just what is being done for our boys overseas will be evident from the following statement:

REST HUTS FOR CANADIANS

Rest Huts are being operated for and used exclusively by Canadian troops, as follows: Great Britain: Bramshot (near Haslemere), 2 Huts; Witley (Mifflord), 3 West Sandling, 1; East Sandling, 1; St. Martin's Plain (Shorncliffe), 1; Digdale Plain, 1; Seaford, 1; Shoreham-by-Sea, 1; France: Hut at Base Camp (Havre). Another at Etaples. The huts at Seaford and Shoreham are what may be termed double huts, meaning that there is one hut for recreation and refreshments and another for meetings. At the other places there is one hut which is on frequent occasions used for meetings.

In addition to the above three large marquees have been sent over to France by International Headquarters and are under the charge of Chaplain-Captain Steele.

WHAT THE HUTS STAND FOR

While this goes some of the way towards describing in actual terms a little that has been accomplished, the greater, vaster, and more valuable work can never be expressed, since so very much of Salvation Army force is active in spirit. A lad enters an Army Hut with the ostensible purpose of purchasing a cup of cocoa. He is away from home for the first time; he is missing many things which have made up his life. Now, when needed most of all, for he is up against terrible odds, he knows they are out of reach; so he comes to pay his penny for cocoa and to receive the gift of a trustful smile from The Army Adjutant's wife. That the Adjutant should find time to sit at his table for just a minute appears quite natural, that the boy should tell him something of what is in his heart, quite the simplest thing in the world; that the Adjutant should guess a lot more and say a lot more than words can make plain, all happens in the most ordinary way; and that the boy should lean his chin on the Adjutant's shoulder and a firm tilt to his chin is what The Army expects, for our optimistic ministry aims at making men—good men!
