Briton Holds World Record For The Mile

PARIS, Feb. 28 (CP)—The International Amateur Athletic Federation today rewrote the book on field record books, giving Great Britain the most prized individual record, the outdoor mile.

It went to the credit of spindly-shanked Sydney Wooderson, successor to New Zealand's Jack Lovelock as the Empire's fastest mile runner. Wooderson was clocked in 4:06.4 in a record-smashing performance that marked in the time at London Aug. 28. At the time his mark was reported as 4:06.4 a tenth of a second faster than the record set by C. Cunningham's standard of 4:07 but it was certified to, and approved by, the I. A. A. F. as 4:06.4.

United States athletes took most of the honors as the I. A. A. F. approved 13 new standards established by Americans, including Owens' disputed 22 seconds flat for 100 metres and Forrest (Spec) 1:00 almost incredible 13.7 seconds for the 110-metre high hurdles.

One record approved today has since been tied by an empire athlete. Bob Osgood, University of Michigan, was recognized as world record holder at 14 seconds flat for the 120-yard high hurdles. Thomas Lacey of South Africa equalled that mark in the recent Empire games at Sydney, Australia. S. A. Eley Robinson of the S. A. Francisco Olympic club was credited with three new world marks—1:49 both for 800 metres and 800 yards, and 2:06.7 for 1,000 yards. Also approved were the 14 feet 11 inch pole vault record by Bill Sefton and Roman's 2,000 metre clogging of 5:16.8.

In the relays, Stanford was credited with a new mark for 800 yards, 1:25. Southern California for one mile, 3:11.6; and Indiana for four miles, 17:16.2.

Not content with the world's record of 129.5 miles an hour, speedster Sir Malcolm Campbell is having a new Bluebird racing boat built in England. Speed boat experts hope for 150 miles an hour before long.

STEEL MAY LOWER COST OF HOUSING

TORONTO, Feb. 28—Brilliantly-colored houses built of steel, on which the various hues of the rainbow will be produced by William Phillips, an authority on electrolysis in a demonstration at the School of Mines of the University of Toronto.

Steel was cheap and would result in lower cost of housing, said Mr. Phillips, but up to the present the problem has been to protect thin sections of steel from corrosion. Electrolysis, or plating, he said, was "coming to the point where we will soon be able to plate large sections of steel with protective zinc, quickly and cheaply, and in steel houses." Corrosion was the greatest problem in metallurgy, said Mr. Phillips, with the loss in Canada annually exceeding the loss from fire.

Using equipment known as a schlieren, Mr. Phillips projected a beam of light through small tanks containing electrolytic solutions, and finally on a screen. In vivid hues, and with peculiar tree-like effects, the chemical and physical metamorphoses of various breeds of metal plating were made visual. Previously, he said, metallurgists and chemists knew only by theory that the schlieren was able to show them visually. For development of the process, which permits study of various solutions and metals, Mr. Phillips has won awards from several universities and societies.

Berwick Bruins Defeat Wolves For League Title

HALIFAX, Feb. 28—Berwick Bruins won the Eastern Hockey League title and the right to enter the Nova Scotia playoffs tonight with a 3-2 victory over Halifax Wolves in the fourth game of what was intended to be a best-of-three series.

Bruins, last year's Nova Scotia champions, finished a poor third in the league but eliminated Kentville in the semi-finals and then trashed Wolverines in a series of four games when the third ended in a 4-4 tie. Tonight's victory was Berwick's first this year on Halifax ice.

The Wolves took a 2-1 lead in the first 20 minutes on scores by Brundage and Ciancy after Copus had slammed one home for the Bruins.

Copus scored again for Berwick at 7:18 of the second and Billy Poked the winning tally home with 16 seconds left to play in that period. The final 30 minutes went scoreless.

Berwick meets New Glasgow at Kentville tomorrow night in a first-round encounter and the teams play again at New Glasgow the following night.

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Enthusiasm is running high and the local squad will not lack for support in their efforts to gain a victory on alien ice. The Crystals and their supporters are, however, just as determined to roll up a safe victory margin to take into the second game and in all a sparkling contest should result.

The two game total goal series was ruled by President Hanson Dowell of the M. H. A. last Friday night when he turned down an Abegweit protest arising out of a question of referees. The two teams as a result were dead-locked at two victories apiece in the playoffs. Referees in tonight's contest will be "Wick" James of Moncton and Roy Prowse.

Western Rinks Defeat Maritimes In Opening Rounds Of Tankard Play

TORONTO, Feb. 28—The Maritime Provincers bid for the MacDonald Brier Trophy at the Dominion curling championship suffered a setback tonight as western rinks continued their supremacy over the east.

Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island representatives dropped second round matches tonight after losing the opening games this afternoon. As in the first round, late rallies by their opponents sent two of the eastern teams down to defeat.

C. W. Durant's Halifax four, representing Nova Scotia, bowed to the British Columbia rink, skipped by Billy Finlay of Vancouver. The Haligonians led 6-6 after eight ends but could not gain a point on the last four ends. New Brunswick's quartet, skippered by D. P. Connolly of Bathurst led the champion Alberta rink of Cliff Manahan 9-7 until the 10th end where three points put the team down to defeat.

Prince Edward Island, after taking a one-sided beating from Saskatchewan in the afternoon, showed improvement from tonight to hold off Burt Hall's strong Ontario four to a 14-12 score. Rankine McLaine's Charlottetown curlers finished strongly on the last two ends but just failed to catch the Kitchener team.

Four rinks were left undefeated in a round highlighted by the 10-9 triumph of Ab Gowanlock's rink, captained by Glenboro over Dr. M. I. Humphries' Saskatchewan champions.

Gaining a split on the day to the Saskatchewan in the standing, Northern Ontario scored on nine ends as they drubbed Quebec 14-5. The results left Quebec, with the three Maritime rinks, with the lowest standing in the tournament.

The veteran Manahan stole the show with a superb display on the fourth and sixth ends when New Brunswick's four threatened to rout the champions. Five up in the first three ends, New Brunswick saw their lead wiped out when Manahan threw two perfect stones on the fourth.

His first look out the New Brunswick shot stone which lay among three Alberta stones and his second knocked out the two remaining New Brunswick rinks on the eighth end. With New Brunswick lying three on the sixth end, Manahan broke up four guards with his first shot and sent his second through a narrow court to count one.
