WOUNDED.—A telegram received Thursday by Mr. John R. Jenkins announced that his son Pte. C. Earle Jenkins No. 712739 infantry, officially reported admitted forty seventh general hospital August 9th gunshot wound left hand. Pte. Jenkins went over with 105th Battalion and was later transferred to the 26th.

NOW TRAINING SHIPS.—The training ships Calvin Austin, Governor Dingley and Governor Cobb, formerly of the Eastern Steamship fleet and the Meade, have already placed in actual service of the merchant marine 1,440 seamen. There are now eleven training ships in the Atlantic squadron, the steamer Minnesota being the latest addition.

WOOL EXPERT HERE.—Mr. Jas. D. Thompson, Dominion Wool Grader, of Ottawa, is in the city in the interests of the Sheep Breeders' Association. This association with the assistance of the Provincial and Federal Governments have been engaged in collecting and grading wool produced on the island this season. 53,854 lbs. have been sold through the Canadian Co-operative Association Ltd., to the manufacturers of Canada. The amount realized is about \$41,000. This is the largest quantity ever sold co-operatively in this province. Last year the amount was 25,000 lbs. Mr. Thompson reports the wool market very strong. The American Government took over the wool clip this year and fixed a price. This summer two wool experts came here from the United States and appraised the 1st and wool at the American prices. Arrangements for the sale of Island lambs, especially breeding animals will be proceeded with. Since the system of selling co-operatively was adopted in Canada four years ago said Mr. Thompson, the annual sales have risen from 300,000 to 5,000,000 lbs.

SOLDIERS OF THE SOIL.—Up to date Prof. McLarty, Director of the Soldiers of the Soil movement in this province, has distributed 200 badges to boys who have been serving continuously for at least three months. These lads have been at many points on the island, and the reports received so far from farmers with whom they have been employed are very favourable. The "farmerettes" have been working almost entirely on the Experimental Farm, weeding, picking fruit, selecting grain, etc. 35 was the greatest number on duty at one time. About 15 boys were on the farm for a short time. The Soldiers of the Soil are receiving as wages from \$15 to \$25 per month.
