

Ottawa Senators Defeat Marlboros 5-2 To Tie Series At Game Apiece

OTTAWA, April 18—(CP)—The revitalized Ottawa Senators, led by high-flying centerman Nils Tremblay, outskated Toronto Marlboros to score a 5-2 victory here tonight and tie up their best-of-seven Eastern Canada hockey final at a game apiece.

A crowd of about 8,000 fans saw Tremblay, pivot of Ottawa's high-scoring "special delivery" line, tally three goals.

The Senators, well-rested and skating at top speed in contrast with their performance in the first game last Friday—won by Marlboros 5-0—took a lead of 2-0 in the first period.

They made it 3-0 in the middle frame before Marlboros came through with their only two goals, a pair of lightning tallies that beat Legs Fraser within 49 seconds. The Senators added two more in the heavy-scoring second period, and the final frame was scoreless.

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Only One Leaf Makes Berth On All-Star Team

TORONTO, April 18—(CP)—Their third straight Stanley Cup conquest accomplished, the world champion Toronto Maple Leafs today are wondering if they will ever be recognized by National Hockey League coaches who select the official all-star team.

Although they lost only one game in the last three cup finals, the Leafs have been practically ignored by the selectors. Walter (Turk) Broda, who won the Vezina Trophy as the league's top goalie last season, was the only Toronto player to gain recognition since pre-war years. No fewer than four major tournaments were staged in addition to the various club competitions.

Included in the tournaments held here which drew golfing tourists in large numbers were the N.B.P.E.T. All served to create a greater interest in the sport and local officials are expecting to see a large increase in club membership.

There is no doubt that he will be a valuable asset and the club will continue to make progress under his direction and guidance.

Bill MacNeill, chairman of the Greens Committee, is pleased with the way the course has wintered and is looking forward to an early start in getting the various greens and fairways in first class shape for the opening of the season the middle of next month.

All-Boston World Series Is Predicted

NEW YORK, April 18—(AP)—The 1949 World Series will be an all-Boston affair in the opinion of the major league baseball writers of the United States.

In an annual pre-season poll conducted by the Associated Press, 70 out of 130 scribes picked the Red Sox to dethrone Cleveland Indians in the American League. The world champions drew only 42 first place votes and trail Joe McCarthy's men in total points, 873 to 902.

The defending champion Braves of the National League drew fewer first place ballots than Brooklyn, 44 to 63—but piled up enough second and third to nose out the Dodgers, 998 to 822 points. The voting is based on total points, rather than first place votes.

In all, six National League teams drew top mention from the scribes, with Chicago Cubs, last-place occupants in '48, getting at least one vote for each of the eight positions. One writer predicted a Cub pennant, while 23 of his brethren confined them to the cellar.

Third place went to Pittsburgh Pirates, who received 12 firsts. St. Louis Cardinals, with seven first-place ballots, placed fourth. Only other National League club to receive first-place consideration was New York Giants, who wound up fifth ahead of Philadelphia, Chicago and Cincinnati. The Reds were almost a solid cellar choice with 93 nominations for the bottom ring.

Only two American League clubs besides Boston and Cleveland were flattered by first-place nomination. New York Yankees, despite the absence of Joe Dimaggio from the line-up, were picked to win the flag by five experts. They ranked third with 696 points. Right on their heels were Philadelphia Athletics, who received three first-place ballots and 632 points.

Detroit headed the second division, followed by St. Louis, Washington and Chicago. The points are figured on an 8, 7, 6, 5, 4, 3, 2, 1 basis.

Browns File Suit To Evict Cards

ST. LOUIS, April 18—(AP)—St. Louis Browns filed suit today to evict the Cardinals from Sportsman's Park, but lawyers predicted legal delays would assure the National League club of a home throughout the 1949 baseball season.

The eviction action, plus a request for \$222,500 damages, is not expected to go to trial before September. Fred M. Salih, who recently bought the Cardinal club, expressed confidence his team will still be the Browns' tenant after the court battle ends.

In going to court, the Browns followed up their ultimatum to the Cardinals in February to vacate the park property. The park is owned by the Browns but under a leasing arrangement it has been used by the Cardinals since 1920.

The Cardinals contend their present lease has two more years to run, with option to renew for 10 years.

Upset Victories Featured Yesterday's Opening Of Major Baseball Leagues

 NEW YORK, April 18—(AP)—The major league baseball season got off to an upset start today as Philadelphia Phillies whipped the National League champion Boston Braves 4-0, and Washington Senators set down the highly-regarded Philadelphia Athletics 3-2.

The remaining inaugurals are set for tomorrow. The American League will see the world champion Cleveland Indians oppose the Browns in St. Louis, Chicago White Sox play in Detroit, Boston Red Sox in Philadelphia and the Senators in New York.

In the National it will be St. Louis Cardinals in Cincinnati, Pittsburgh Pirates in Chicago and New York Giants in Brooklyn. The Phils and Braves will engage in a traditional doubleheader in Boston. A skippy 9,195 crowd saw lefty Ken Heintzelman ruin Boston's first National League flag raiser in 34 years by pitching the Phils to a shutout triumph over the Braves in

cold and wind-swept Braves Field. To make matters worse for the tribemen, Johnny Sain, their 24-game winning ace of last year, was the victim of Heintzelman's airtight pitching. Heintzelman limited the Braves to five hits, three of them by sophomore shortstop Alvin Dark.

Sain was touched for only seven hits, but was unusually wild. A near capacity crowd of 26,000 including President Truman, saw the Senators snatch victory from defeat by scoring two runs in the last of the ninth to nip the A's, Two straight pinch-hit doubles by Sherry Robertson and Eddie Stewart knotted the score at 2-2.

With the bases loaded and Nick Fowler of Toronto retired, Clyde Lewis on a foul pop. But Buddy Vollmer, graduate of the Syracuse International League club, singled to score Stewart with the winning run. Ray Scarborough, ace of the Phils' staff last year, scattered seven hits to register the victory.

Sport Echoes From Prince County

Although it will be a few days yet before the winner of the Allan Cup is decided, hockey has just about disappeared from the picture here on Prince Edward Island. All the major basketball championships have also been decided so there is only the prospects of another season of baseball to stir the pulses of the sports-minded people of Prince County.

As regards the Summerside Town League the picture is pretty much the same as last year, although two of the old teams will play under new sponsorships. Last year's Legion will crack out hits and chase files under the name of Holman's, and the Red Sox will go up on the scoreboard as Curran & Briggs. It is not certain that the Juniors will operate as a unit this year. The Kinsmen have not as yet decided whether they will sponsor an aggregation of juniors, and if they decide not to, the teen-agers will probably catch on with one of the two other town teams.

As usual, the personnel of the R. C. A. F. nine will be the big question mark of the pre-season. So many newcomers have come into the local airport of late that the baseball heads themselves probably do not know what material they have for the season's competition. They haven't lost any of last year's first-string performers, so if they are lucky enough to pick up a few diamonds in the rough, or perhaps they should try smoothing out the diamond, they will be definitely the team to beat in this year's local circuit, particularly if the Juniors stick together and do not separate to reinforce the other two town teams.

If the Juniors do not function under the Kinsmen banner, we think it might be a good idea to form a third team in the town, as two teams will not provide playing berths for all the local ball players. The Curran & Briggs outfit will probably not depend entirely on last year's Red Sox to fill up their playing roster, as they had some promising players on the construction crew club which played softball and baseball last summer. With these additions, and ten or more Juniors to be absorbed into the two teams there will be some baseball players who will do a lot of bench warming this season. Three teams would make for better baseball, but there are other things to think of besides the quality of play.

As regards the younger ball players, nothing definite can be said until the athletic meeting to be held in the Town Hall under the direction of Brigadier Bill Reid this Wednesday night. The director of the "Physical Fitness" program here on the Island will probably have some ideas up his sleeve concerning the organized play of these youngsters under the Juniors age, and we shall have to await the outcome of this meeting before sizing up the situation.

Whether the Summerside All-Stars will participate in the Central League this summer is also pretty much in the air at present. There is probably much to be said, pro and con, relative to such participation and no doubt it will be thrashed out in plenty of time to enter this league should the decision to do so be taken.

If present plans materialize Island baseball fans will get an opportunity to see a ball game at night here in Summerside this summer. The Philadelphia Colored Giants will tour the Maritimes, bringing with them their own lighting system, and they have expressed a wish to visit Summerside. If arrangements can be made, such an unusual event as a baseball game played at night should attract a large crowd of spectators. People not particularly interested in baseball would probably be on hand to witness such a spectacle.

A word of welcome to the new president and secretary of the Summerside Baseball League. Ft. Lt. Joe Ross and Sgt. Don Carson. It is fitting, we think, that the senior officers of the organization should come every three years or so from the local airport, whose sports leaders have done so much to awaken baseball, basketball and hockey enthusiasm in the town. In Joe Ross we have a sportsman whose tact and good judgment can be relied upon, and who will, we predict, carry us through a successful season. "Moose" Carson, our new secretary, is well-known to all baseball and basketball enthusiasts of Prince County. A member of the Maritime champions in baseball and the Island champs in basketball, "Moose" has done his share to put both teams on the pedestals where they are now perched, and if he proves as good at keeping the records straight as he has done as a basketball guard and a baseball batter and left fielder, we have nothing to worry about.

To Herb Schurman, retiring president, and John McNeill, retiring secretary, on behalf of fandom we say "thanks" for difficult and trying jobs well done. Herb will of course be still on the executive in the capacity of past-president and his experience should help the new officers, as will the experience of

Cote Favoured To Repeat In 53rd Boston Marathon

BOSTON, April 18—(CP)—More than 180 marathon runners from the United States, Canada, Britain, Sweden and Guatemala will start on the 26-mile-385-yard stink Tuesday in the 53rd running of the Boston Athletic Association's marathon.

Four former winners will be entered, including the 1948 victor, capable, cigar-smoking Gerard Cote of St. Hyacinthe, Que. Yun Bok Suk, the Korean who set the course record of 2:25.39 in 1947, apparently has been scratched. Amid Korean Government red tape, reports said Suk would not run because: 1. He was out of condition. 2. He was too busy. 3. He had just married.

Cote, who has won four of these B.A.A. endurance tests since 1940, looms as the outstanding favorite. His most threatening rivals appear to be Sweden's Karl Posta Leandersson; Jesse Van Zant of San Francisco, who finished third last year; Luis Valesquez of Guatemala; two-time winner Johnny Kelly of Boston; and newcomer Vic Dyrvall of New York.

Other entries who rate serious consideration among the bulky field include such seasoned veterans as Lloyd Evans, Montreal, Ab Morton, Galt, Ont., and Fred Bristow of Toronto.

For the winner there dangles a slender jackpot—merely the traditional laurel wreaths, the medal, and his name and picture in the papers.

Battle Lines Down For Hockey Meeting In Toronto Today

 TORONTO, April 18—(CP)—Battle lines were drawn tonight for probably one of the most important, and decisive meetings between the brass of the National Hockey League and the minor pro groups on one side and the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association on the other. The session is scheduled for tomorrow afternoon.

The "amateurs"—president Al Pickard of Regina, Dr. W.G. Hardy of Edmonton, Frank Sargent of Fort Arthur and George Dudley of Midland, Ont.—were closeted behind closed doors during the afternoon and evening discussing so-called "routine" matters.

"No conclusions came out of our talks," Dudley said in an eye-of-the-battle interview. "We'll be meeting again in the morning and meet the pros at 1:30 p.m."

The professionals, representing the N.H.L., American Hockey League, United States League, gathered in the same downtown hotel. With N.H.L. president Clarence Campbell are Jack Adams of Detroit Red Wings; Maurice Podoloff, president of the A.H.L.; James Hendy of the U.S. Hockey League and Tommy Lockhart of New York's Madison Square Gardens.

"I haven't anything particularly to say," Campbell said. "I'm just hopeful that something will come out of the meeting that will be beneficial to both amateur and professional hockey."

"We just want to bring amateur hockey under some degree of control. Mind you, I don't want to control it. I just want to see them have some control over it. I don't think it is financially possible for them to carry on."

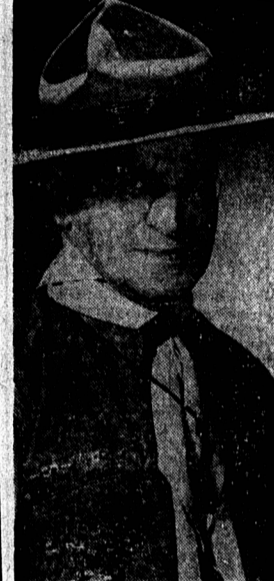
Campbell did not amplify his remarks, but it is believed a full-scale review of amateur-professional relationships are on the books for the meeting, to be held in camera.
