THE annual musical examinations in Canada of the Associated Board of the Royal Academy of Music and the Royal College of Music begin at Charlottetown P. E. I., on Saturday. The examiner in practical subjects, Mr. H. W. Richards, Mus. Bac., Professor of Music at Edinburgh University will reach New York on the White Star liner Majestic, tomorrow and will proceed at once to Charlottetown. He will reach Quebec on Monday and Montreal later in the week. He sails from Vancouver for Australia after holding examination in all the principal cities of Canada on Aug 29. Mr. Henry R. Rose, F. R. A. M., who was to have been the examiner for Canada, has been prevented from taking the voyage by sickness. The theoretical examinations of the Associated Board take place from one end of Canada to the other on June 18, and the papers of all candidates will be examined by Mr. Richards before he sails for Australia. His Majesty King Edward VII., who, as Prince of Wales, was one of the principal organizers of the Royal College of Music, and who up to the time of his accession to the throne was President of the Associated Board, has accepted the position of Patron of the Board. The examinations of the Associated Board in Montreal will be held in the Royal Victoria College for Women, Sherbrooke street.

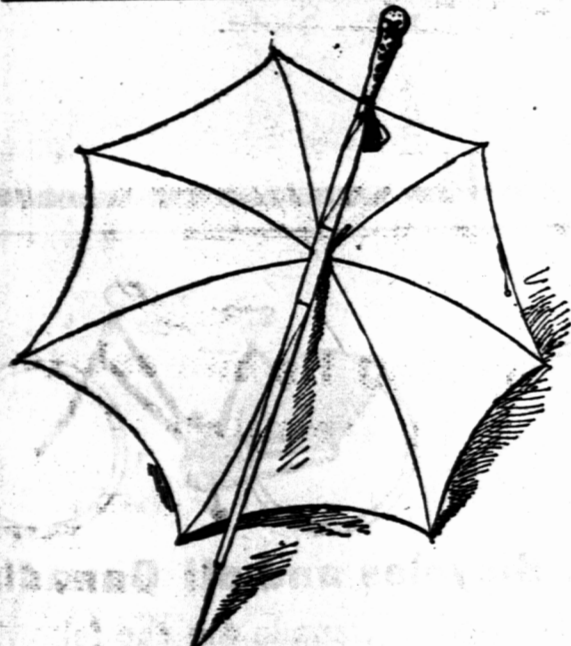

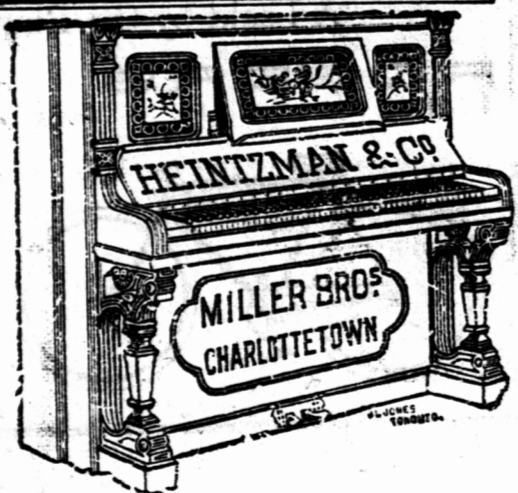
