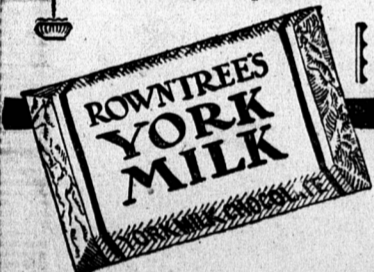

### CENTRAL CHRISTIAN CHURCH

Dr. Robt. F. Whiston gave a most amusing and instructive lecture last night in the Central Christian Church on the signing of the Armistice and what led up to that event. Dr. Whiston was a Chaplain with the United States Army in France and gave his information as he saw it from the points he served. He stated that it was generally understood by the boys in France that both England and France were against the signing of the Armistice at the time and only after profound discussion was it granted finally. The Chaplain said, "We must remember that not a shot had been fired on German soil and not an inch of German territory devastated. Germany was not a defeated nation, in that any casualties had taken place in her own territory. There are many who believe that the war ended too suddenly and only time can make plain the riddle." The Evangelist paid a great tribute to English valor and nobility, saying that "England's

buckling down to fight under a French Marshall was a marvelous thing and the statement of the English Admiralty at the close of the war that 'the United States navy had gone neck and neck with the British navy' demonstrated the fineness and fairness of the English." The sermonette by the Evangelist on "The Man Jesus Called Down" was on the conversion of Zacchaeus and Dr. Whiston stated that the meeting of Christ and this Publican, was a great meeting of a great sinner and a great Saviour. There was hope for Zacchaeus, said he, because Zacchaeus was brainy and active, took Jesus home with him and received Jesus joyfully. Tonight the theme will be "From Jerusalem to Jericho" based on the parable of the Good Samaritan, and new light on this old story is promised. The Junior Congregation will put over a short but inspiring program, and there will be other music. Friday night Dr. Whiston will give a lecture sermon on "Daniels of Today."

### MARY MACNEILL

On Sunday, March 19th, at six p.m. at the Isolation Hospital, Lowell, Mass., there passed peacefully to her Eternal Home, Mary MacNeill, at the age of sixty-one years, after a long

illness borne with Christian fortitude. "Mary," as she was familiarly known, was a former resident of Crepaud, Prince Edward Island, and about seven years ago moved, with her son Lawrence, to Lowell, Mass., where she has since resided and was well known and highly respected.

Although in failing health for some time it was not until February, last that she was removed to the hospital and despite all that loving care and skillful nursing could do her spirit winged its flight to Him who gave it.
