Jackson to Trotsky, insists she had no knowledge that Jackson planned to kill him or that she knew he was a Soviet agent. The police were guarding Jackson in the city and sometimes in the hospital, sometimes in her home, and sometimes in the city. She was interviewed by the police and requested by her father, Samuel Agon, who is expected to arrive in the city this afternoon and went into conference with Mrs. Trotsky on funeral plans while hundreds filed past the coffin, lying in a private funeral chapel.

OVER 12,000 REGISTER

EPIDEMIC OF INTESTINAL DISORDERS

A widespread epidemic of intestinal disorders has been general throughout the province during the past few days. It is fairly well under control at present, however. Dr. B. C. Keating, Deputy Minister of Public Health, said yesterday. He attributed the outbreak to a change in diet due to the introduction of new and different vegetables. Although the epidemic visited almost all sections of the province, it was particularly severe in the Rustico area where two children succumbed to the illness. A number of cases were reported in Charlottetown. Medical men used a weapon known as "dehydration" to fight the disease. It is a process of injecting fluid into the bodies of the victims to replace the excessive loss of fluid due to the ravages of the disease.
