### Truth Serum Banned Blood Transfusionist Gets Death Messages

WINDSOR, Aug. 26.—Attorney-General William F. Noble has banned Dr. E. H. House's truth serum from use among prisoners of the province, according to word received today by Crown Attorney James S. Allan, who has been instructed to notify Sheriff J. N. Anderson that neither Arthur Jan-ling, held in connection with the murder of Clayton McMulla, nor any other prisoner shall be a subject of Dr. House's "scopolamin." It had been planned to have Jan-ling take the serum during the convention of the International Fingerprint Experts, which will open this week. Dr. House has been invited to demonstrate with his serum, but the police and other officials connected with criminal work in the county will be instructed that Dr. House must not inject his serum into any prisoner held here.

### Blood Transfusionist Gets Death Messages

LONDON, Aug. 26.—Physicians and psychologists throughout England today are interested in a strange tetraphy by which Frederick George Lee, professional supply source for blood transfusions, gets death messages from those his blood should save. Lee, who is an ex-army sergeant, is employed at the Middlesex hospital. He has given his blood 24 times since 1922 for transfusions. Seventeen of the patients have lived; the other seven died. In each of the seven cases at the exact instant of the patient's death Lee has felt a severe pain in his arm and has immediately been overcome with illness. By these symptoms he knows that the patient has passed on. What makes his case all the more strange is the fact that Lee never sees the patient to whom his blood is given.

### RICH MINERS SAIL FOR EUROPE

POTTSVILLE, Pa., Aug. 26.—Fifty additional foreigners arranged for passage abroad with local agents today. All are miners, who expect to cease work September 1 and remain away from the mines until another wage contract is arranged.

Some of the men will take as much as \$10,000 to Europe, which they will invest there if opportunities occur. Many have received information that, with \$10,000 in American money, much may be done in Central Europe. One miner who got his passage today said: "Why, I can clean up nearly the whole real estate in my native town with the money I have saved, because of the depreciation in values as compared with American money."

It is believed several thousand miners will go abroad from this country. Nearly all are American citizens and it is expected that they will return, as many own their homes or have other investments. Experience in previous suspensions shows that 75 per cent. of those going back to their native countries return to the United States.

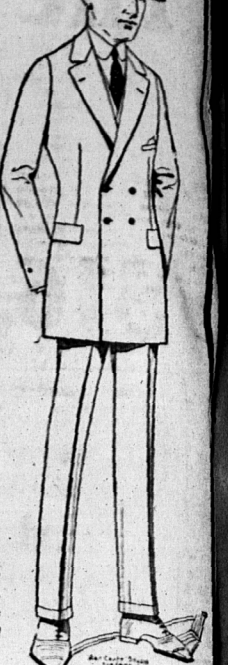

QUEBEC, August 26.—Two thousand gallons of gasoline and a couple of hundred tons of hay, as well as a general cargo, went up in smoke tonight, when the schooner Germain L., bound for North Shore ports, caught fire in mid-stream near Quebec and burned to the water's edge, with a loss of thousands of dollars.

### 4.4 Declared Not A Liquor Substitute

RITCHENER, Ont., Aug. 26.—According to information submitted to a sub-committee of the Alcoholic Traffic Committee of the House of Representatives of Washington, D. C., at a meeting held here last night, Ontario's 4.4 per cent. beer is not a satisfactory substitute for liquor, nor has it turned away the addicts to spirituous liquors from such liquor. Among other questions asked by the visiting congressmen, was "Has it eliminated the bootlegger?" Local speakers were of the opinion that it has not.

### Predicts Edittress Will Be Deported

LONDON, Aug. 26.—A Melbourne despatch to the Morning Post says that the prompt issue by the Federal Government of a proclamation declaring a state of industrial disturbance exists comes as a rude shock to leaders of the striking seamen, most of whom find themselves liable to deportation under the recently amended Immigration Act, which empowers the authorities to call upon persons not born in Australia and concerned in acts of hindrance and obstruction to show cause why they should not be deported.
