The following report for the month submitted by Chief of Police Birtwistle was presented by Councillor

Table with columns: Offences, Arrests, Convictions, Dismissals, Total, Remarks. Includes items like Drunk I. C. Motor Vehicle, Drunk & Disorderly, etc.

In addition to above arrests there were six convictions and two dismissals under the Motor Vehicle Act for "speeding", one conviction for reckless driving, two for breach of the "Stop" By-law, three for corner loafing, and one under the Sanitary By-law.

We assisted the Prohibition Officers in fourteen searches of premises suspected of the unlawful sale or possession of intoxicating liquors. Ten prosecutions were entered resulting in eight convictions and two dismissals. One old offender was sentenced to eight months and two others each to six months imprisonment in the County Jail without the options of Fines.

On April 23rd and 24th, the Force collected 45 samples of milk and eight (8) of cream from store-keepers, same being delivered to the City Analyst for Test. Regarding the collection of milk samples on March 19th and 20th last, from Licensed Milk Vendors, four samples of which were found to contain sediment, as reported by the City Analyst at the last monthly meeting of the City Council, the Vendors from whom the four samples referred to were collected, have been prosecuted under the City By-law respecting Milk and Milk Vendors, a fine of five dollars being imposed in each case.

The amounts collected in Fines and Costs imposed in the City Police Court during April are as follows: Prohibition Act Fines \$110.00, One Fine imposed under the Customs Act \$100.00, Miscellaneous Fines and costs collected \$189.20, Total amount collected \$289.20. Other duties performed by the Force during April are as follows: Prisoners escorted to the Queen's County Jail 27, Summonses served 35, Subpoenas served 5, Dwelling houses quarantined 6, Dwelling houses released from quarantine 7, Persons in Station for protection over night 5, Escorted to Falconwood 1, Dogs destroyed 2.

CONTROL MEASURES
The insects, after they are half-grown, are very active and seek shelter when alarmed. This makes it difficult to destroy them with any ordinary contact insecticide; and, since they are sucking insects, they are not affected by stomach poisons. The thorough cleaning up and burning of weeds along fences and hedges and all crop refuse, either in autumn or early spring, will aid in the destruction of many unhatched eggs. The young bugs in the bright-red stage after hatching are conspicuous on weeds, particularly burdock, and may be easily killed by spraying with nicotine spray or dusting with a nicotine dust. Kerosene emulsion may be used, or on burdocks and weeds of no value, boiling or very hot water applied from a dipper or teakettle.
