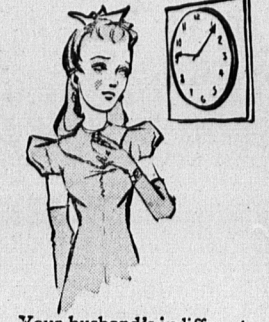

**Induction of Rev. T. H. B. Somers Sept. 25**

The Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in special session last evening at St. James Church for the purpose of considering a call to the Rev. T. H. B. Somers, M.A., B.D., of Toronto. The Rev. T. O. Hughes, of Montague acted as moderator and the Rev. J. C. McNeill was appointed clerk, pro tem.

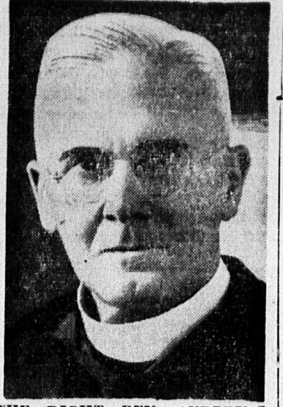
The call, which was very hearty and unanimous was presented to the court by the Rev. G. Carlyle Webster, interim moderator. Representatives of the congregation attested its unanimity and it was accepted by a unanimous vote and placed in the hands of Mr. Somers who intimated his intention of acceptance.

Arrangements were then made for the induction and the date was set for Thursday, September 25, at 8 p. m. A. D. T.

**United Church Moderator To Visit P. E. I.**



**THE RIGHT REV. AUBREY S. TUTTLE, M.A., D.D., LL.D.**

Dr. Aubrey S. Tuttle, recently selected as Moderator to the United Church of Canada, will visit Charlottetown on Sunday morning, Sept. 21st, and Summerside on Sunday evening.

Dr. Tuttle was born in Pugwash, N.S. He entered the ministry in 1897 as a student missionary in the former Methodist Church and served for three years at Bridgetown, New Harbor and Truro.

He graduated from Mount Allison University in Arts and Theology in 1905, obtained his Master of Arts degree from Mount Allison University in 1907 with first-class honours in Philosophy.

Transferring to the Alberta Conference, he was pastor of Grace Church, Edmonton, for four years. He also served in three other parishes: Wesley Church, Calgary, Fifth Avenue Church, Medicine Hat, and McDougall Church, Edmonton. During his term at Wesley Church, Calgary, the present church building was built.

In 1919 he was appointed Principal of Alberta College South, which was amalgamated with Robertson Presbyterian College at the time of Union as St. Stephen's College. Since Union he has been Principal and Professor of Christian Theology and Philosophy of Religion at St. Stephen's College.

Dr. Tuttle was President of the former Alberta Methodist Conference in 1918 and of the Alberta Conference of the United Church in 1934.

From Mount Allison University in 1926 he received the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity and the degree of Doctor of Laws from the University of Alberta in 1936.

**"Dive Bomber" Pioneers New Screen Story Field**

Errol Flynn and Fred MacMurray star in Technicolor Film Coming to Prince Edward

Timely as tomorrow is "Dive Bomber" the new picture which the Prince Edward Theatre will show starting today and Saturday. The big Technicolor special tells the story of the Navy's unsung heroes who fly more for science than for glory and who made possible the development of dive-bombing.

"Dive Bomber," not only pioneers a brand new (to the screen) story line, it sets precedent in a lot of other ways.

Errol Flynn, who has been called "the most beautiful man in the world," is co-starred with Fred MacMurray, an even-Stephen matter.

MacMurray is the one who does the flying, dies the hero's death.

Flynn is a medic, working with the doctors, solving the mysteries of what happens to men in the stratosphere: black out, high altitude sickness, aerobemolism, night blindness, etc., etc. He plays the role straight, on the serious side.

One of the biggest scenes in the picture goes to Louis Jean Heydt, an able actor well established, but a stranger to most audiences, until they see him and then say "Oh, yes, I remember that fellow in..." MacMurray killed off late in the story, naturally doesn't get the girl, played by exotic-looking newcomer Alexis Smith.

Neither does Flynn. In fact she doesn't "get" anybody in the picture. She's a divorcee, out for a good time with almost any man in a navy uniform. And in the picture all the men are too busy with naval aviation matters to give her more than a quick kiss and a pleasant brush of the hand.

"Dive Bomber" has another definite bid as the picture unique. Being filmed, as it was with complete navy cooperation and under strictest navy scrutiny to make certain that every single thing was right, it has had six high-ranking technical directors, three of them commanders, one a captain (Captain George D. Murray of the aircraft carrier Enterprise), and two flight lieutenants.

Because the navy gave full cooperation, millions upon millions of public dollars worth of planes, ground equipment, building facilities and landing fields, not to mention the U. S. S. Enterprise itself, were turned over to director Michael Curtiz, "shot" by the color cameras for the action-packed film.

Repeated bombing raids on British port areas and the industrial Midlands has attracted fresh attention to the frightful suffering of the many thousands of civilians in Great Britain who are harried from shelter to shelter and finally driven into the open country by successive raids. Eventually places are found for them all, places of relative security, but their belongings of all kinds are destroyed. The task of emergency feeding alone is difficult. The task of setting them up once more with some quantity of clothing and bedding is much more difficult.

To meet these enormous needs, funds have been started in various parts of the world. Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth has permitted the use of her name in connection with the Dominion campaign, which is officially known as "The Queen's Canadian Fund for Air Raid Victims."

**AIRMEN HAVE NARROW ESCAPE**—Four members of the Royal Air Force escaped serious injury when a car, in which they were returning to the Charlottetown Airport, ran over a rut in the road. The accident occurred about 4:30 p.m. on the Brackley Point Road about a mile from the camp. The driver was in the act of passing a horse and cart. The car ran into the rut and, although the mishap took place, pulling out too far to clear the horse-drawn vehicle, the driver put the car over the pavement and the soft shoulder caused it to slide into a ditch and roll over. Although the occupants escaped with a shaking up, the vehicle was badly damaged and had to be towed back to Charlottetown for repairs.

**NO INCREASE IN TURNIP RATES**—There is no question about any increase in rail rates for turnips above those now in effect, was the encouraging statement made yesterday by Mr. J. W. Boulter, Manager of the P. E. I. Potato Growers Association who has returned to the Province from Washington where he represented the Provincial Potato Producers' Commission before the Interstate Commerce Commission effecting the special or water competitive rates on turnips to water ports in Eastern United States. "Any change in the present set of tariffs would certainly cause an unfortunate situation for island shippers." The hearing was held on Tuesday. Mr. Boulter returned by the American Airlines route to Boston and from there to Moncton and thence to Charlottetown by Trans-Canada Lines. The entire flying time from Washington to Charlottetown did not exceed seven hours.

**Soldiers will Drill in City today**

Marking the observance of Reconciliation Week, a company of 300 soldiers from No. 6 Canadian Infantry Training Centre at Beach Grove, will carry out training exercises on various City squares today. This will be done in co-operation with those in charge of the Reconciliation week observance and with a view of giving citizens a chance to witness actual training work. Clad in battle dress, the men will leave camp under command of Lt.-Col. F. I. Andrew, M.M., O.C., at 8:30 and arrive in Charlottetown at 9:45 a. m. Anti-tank guns, machine guns, gas masks and other implements of modern warfare will be brought into play as the boys go through their drill. One-half the company will carry out anti-tank and machine-gun training on King Square while the other half carry out respiratory and anti-tank gun drills on Hillsborough or Convent Square.

The company will assemble at the Hillsborough Square at 11 a. m. and will march by way of Weymouth Street, Great George, Richmond, Prince and Kent Streets to the Armouries where the men will have dinner.

The company will fall-in at 1 p. m. and one-half will carry out anti-tank fighting and platoon drill on Rochford Square and the other half will carry out similar training on Riverside Park. (This is commonly known as the Old Jail Square and is near the foot of Richmond St.)
