A Hundred Thousand More Men to Join

N. Y. OFFICIALS RESIGN

Report Abouts President McKinley—Unknown Falls Dead at St. John.

CH'TOWN FIREMEN AT HALIFAX TOURNAMENT

The Representatives of the Garden of the Gulf do Splendid Work.

THE SALVAGE CORPS SECURES FIRST PLACE

And but for a Slip in the Hose Reel Competition Would Have Made an Almost Clear Sweep—The Competitors and Winners in the Individual Events—The Prizes Won and To-day's Program.

HALIFAX, Aug. 7.—Four thousand people witnessed the firemen's sports to-day including nearly 800 firemen. Charlottetown won the lion's share of the prizes and but for a slip in the Hose Reel competition they would have made an almost clear sweep.

CHARLOTTETOWN SALVAGE CORPS WINS THE QUARTER MILE.

The Charlottetown Salvage Corps won their event in 1 minute 4 3/5 seconds. Halifax was second in 1.51.5.

The Charlottetown team drew first position and consequently was the first team to go over the course.

CH'TOWN HOSE REEL WINS SECOND.

In the Hose Reel Race, half a mile, nine teams started. The Charlottetown team covered the distance in 2:33 3/5 but did not tighten the coupling satisfactorily and for this neglect three seconds were added to their time, thus giving the race to Halifax, who made the distance in 2:40 4/5. Charlottetown was second, the time including the

added seconds being 2:41 3/5.

100 YARDS OPEN HOOK AND LADDER.

Alvin Anderson of the Charlottetown Hook and Ladder team won the 100 yards run open to Hook and Ladder men. Lem Selder of Charlottetown was second.

QUARTER MILE RUN OPEN TO HOSE MEN.

The quarter mile run open to Hose Reel men was won by Conrod of Truro. Kent of Truro was second, and Donahoe of Charlottetown was third. Time was 56 1/5 seconds.

300 YARDS DASH OPEN TO SALVAGE CORPS.

"Toby" McMillan of the Charlottetown Salvage Corps team won the 100 yards dash for the Salvage Corps men. Frank Creamer of Charlottetown was second and Duffy of Charlottetown was 3rd. The boys are all feeling well and hope to show up well tomorrow, when the 300 yards, Hose Reel and the 300 yards Hook and Ladder races will be held. There will also be a half mile run. The Wanderers' Electric Light sports are taking place to-night and the Charlottetown companies are represented in the bicycle and athletic events.

ONE WEEK'S CAPTURES

Boers Everywhere Driven Back—Lyttleton May Succeed Kitchener.

LYTTLETON MAY SUCCEED KITCHENER.

LONDON, August 7.—(Special.)—The announcement that Lieut Gen. Lyttleton will accompany Lord Milner to South Africa seems to lend color to the report that Lyttleton will succeed Lord Kitchener. He is considerably the senior of any general officer in South Africa.

ONE WEEK'S RESULT IN WAR.

Lord Kitchener telegraphs, that since July 29th 48 Boers have been killed, 19 wounded, 229 taken prisoner and 57 surrendered.

One pompom, 141 rifles, 8,669 rounds of ammunition, 182 wagons and many horses and stock have been captured.

VILJOEN DRIVEN BACK.

Viljoen has been driven across the Oliphant River. Kakewich and Alentey are moving against the Boers in Magaberg.

OTHER SUCCESSFUL MOVEMENTS.

Seobell inflicted heavy loss on the Boers under Latagan operating in Cape Colony. General Smith-Dorrien has successfully engaged Commandant Smith, and Gorringe has driven Myberg north west of Kissingen, capturing horses and prisoners.
