CIVIC MATTERS

Sir:—The date for the civic nomination is at hand and still the candidates continue to publish their non-committal cards.

Our Civic Control (the council and Water Commissioners) comprises a dozen citizens; just ordinary citizens, sometimes very ordinary. The opinions of these citizens are no better after their election than before. It is fair reasoning then that the opinions of these citizens are no better than the opinions of any dozen average citizens outside the Council. These applicants for honors say "Elect us and we will do our best," but what that "best" may be they leave us to conjecture. They may or may not have opinions worth considering. If they have they either cannot express or will not divulge them; yet they have the temerity to ask us to promise to mark a secret ballot for them.

What we have had offered thus far is nothing but glittering generalities and vote-catching illusions. It does not require genius to be in favor of high wages and low taxes. Anyone can approve of cheap water if someone else has to make the rates. "Enforcing Civic Bylaws" and violating Provincial Statutes is not high class citizenship. Ad for the dust nuisance it would be cheaper to be in favor of a shower of rain at five o'clock every morning, with an extra heavy dash on market days. This would save hauling water with either horse or auto and the back streets would get a fair share. Grand scheme! Then if we just get the snow to fall on the middle of the streets, and leave the gutters open, when a thaw comes the water will run off instead of inundating the sidewalks and other low places.

Seriously, though Gentlemen it is about time to get down to business. Within one week after the election our new Commissioners may commit us to a policy which the next twenty-five years cannot alter or retrieve. We are asleep and the would-be Councilors and Commissioners want to get through the election without our awaking. We were asleep while

foreign capital got its clutches on our lighting system. We awoke in time to see it slipping through our fingers, then we turned over and went to sleep again. Are we going to awake again to find these same talons around our water system? There is not the slightest doubt that the incoming Commissioners will be confronted with a proposition to electrify our water system. The gas plant will be discontinued. Our sewage pumping station will require a change of power. Here is a proposition.—Build a power-station at the water front, generate our power for pumping in the city and send it to the pumping station on wires instead of in dump carts at seventy-five cents per load, use this same source of power for the sewerage pumps and stone crusher, and be ready to take on the street lighting at the expiration of the present contract. To grapple successfully with such a situation the Council and Commissioners will require to compare of hand to approve or reject such a proposition let them at least pledge themselves not to act hastily or without the consent of the electors. If new steam pumps are now installed the system will never be electrified. If electric pumps are installed and power taken from the Electric Co., we will never again get control of our water system or street lighting.

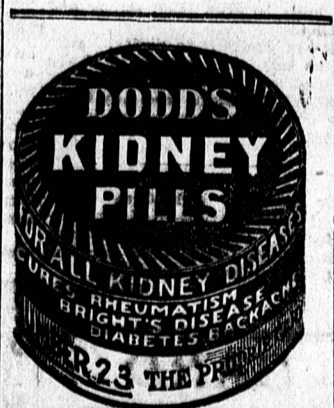
