The course was most successful and well attended by a large number of interested students.

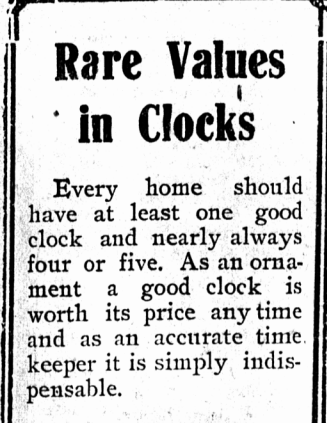

**REPORTERS GO ON STRIKE**  
NEW YORK, Jan. 16.—Reporters and other writers on the Jewish daily, and other papers of the city to-day added another strike to the labor unrest. Editors-in-chief, city editors and even stockholders are gathering and writing the news for these papers and the proprietors declare the editions would be issued as early as usual. The strikers, members of the Jewish Writers' union, demanded a minimum wage scale of \$25 weekly; an agreement that no reporter shall be forced to write more than three columns a day and less blue pencilling of copy by the editors. Strikes in three big industries are in progress in this city and efforts of various mediatory bodies to settle the differences had accomplished nothing up to tonight. Summed up the situation to-night is as follows:  
More than 150,000 workers are involved in the great strike in the garment making industry, which has been in progress for weeks and has grown rapidly in proportions in the last few days. Continued conferences to-day had no apparent results toward ending the strike and further meetings between manufacturers and operatives are necessary. To-night a committee of thirty representing the International Hotel Workers' union and the Industrial Workers of the World was in conference to decide whether to issue a strike order calling out 12,000 waiters, cooks and helpers of various classes in an effort to tie up the hotels and restaurants of the city in enforcing wage and other demands of the men. By a vote of ten to one about 5,000 hotel employees, it was announced, voted in favor of the proposed strike.
