Mr. Paul Harvey Fox, Maryland, U.S.A., ex-playwright and author, has purchased the home of Mr. Ralph MacDonald, Lower Montague, where he intends to spend the winter. Mr. Fox passed the summer in Lower Montague, and has recently returned from a trip to New York. Mr. Fox is a noted author and many of his books, besides being published in the United States, have been published in England, Spain, Belgium and Denmark.

He has expressed approval of our climate here, and finds it very exhilarating. For some years Mr. Fox has written plays for Hollywood, and since then has concentrated on book material. He has not indicated whether he would write a book while here but he does intend to enjoy the winter season in this locale.

On Thursday morning Dr. B.C. Keeping and Miss Darling, Red Cross nurse, gave all Grade XI students their annual medical examination at the Montague Memorial High School. In the afternoon Dr. Keeping and Miss Darling held a vaccination clinic at which almost all of the student body was vaccinated. Many mothers also brought their pre-school children to be vaccinated so as to immunize them against smallpox, the dread disease of children. For many this was the last opportunity of being vaccinated at the school, and the twenty-two students of Grade XI took advantage of the opportunity to be vaccinated, since many had not been vaccinated during the past six years.

Although the duck season has been opened for a week, there have been very few seen flying in this locality. Opening day saw a large crowd of hunters on Pisiquid Pond, which held quite a number of ducks. With the dawn, guns began to blaze at the head of the pond, and before long the ducks arose in a body to speed out of the pond. Many hunters who collected their spoil, noticed the presence of many teal, which seem to be greater in number than the black duck. It was reported that opening day was also good at Fortune where many ducks were taken. However, it is noticed that the quantity of duck is not as large as previous years with only a few arriving here.

These who have seen quite a number of ducks in the evening, but in the marshes and coves very few have been seen. Almost the same situation exists here with regard to Huns. On Wednesday afternoon one party travelled sixty miles over the country roads without flushing one covey. Those who have been fortunate enough to shoot a few report them small and undeveloped, which is probably due to the late nesting season.

Pheasants are also not populous although some have been seen in the wooded areas. It is still too early to state definitely how they have turned out, but a better idea of their quantity will be more in evidence when the season opens.

Construction has already begun on the road of the new MacDonald Avenue in Montague, under the supervision of Pons and Beer, construction company. The bank to the approach of the road from the main street has been entirely removed by the carry-all under the operation of Mr. Paddy Lucas who has made an excellent job of grading the new road. Mr. Athol MacKinnon, the owner, has been in consultation with Mr. Beardon, government surveyor who has laid out the new road. It is expected that the grader will arrive in a short time to complete the top of the road and the ditches. The road is to have a steady grade from the main street to the back road and will have a thirty foot top. On both sides ample room has been left for sidewalks. The new electric line from Charlottetown comes down this side of the rear of the houses, thereby re-

moving the line of poles down the side of the road. Already several houses have been erected, and some are under construction. It is hoped that this road will eventually be paved, making this section one of the finest residential regions in the town.

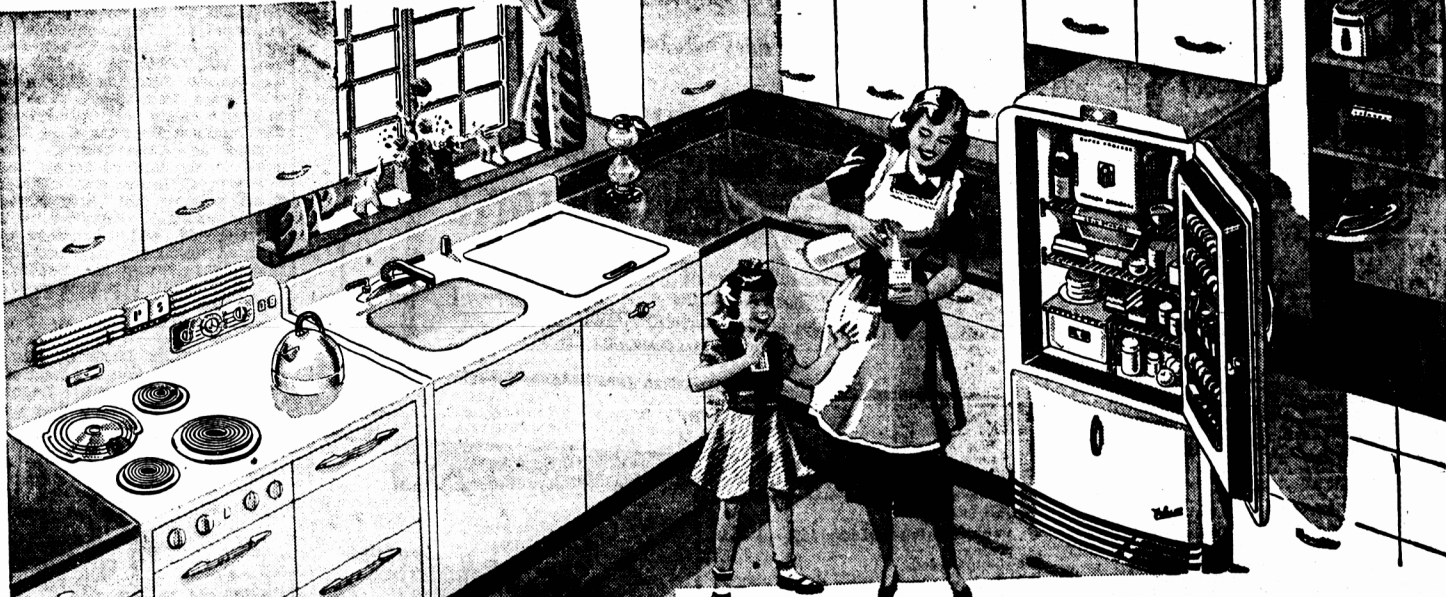
