ALDERSHOT, England, Dec. 4 — (CP Cable) — In pouring rain Princess Elizabeth, as colonel-in-chief of the 1st Battalion of the Canadian Scottish today inspected the Regiment and presented five prizes to replace those lost or damaged in action in Europe since D-Day.
